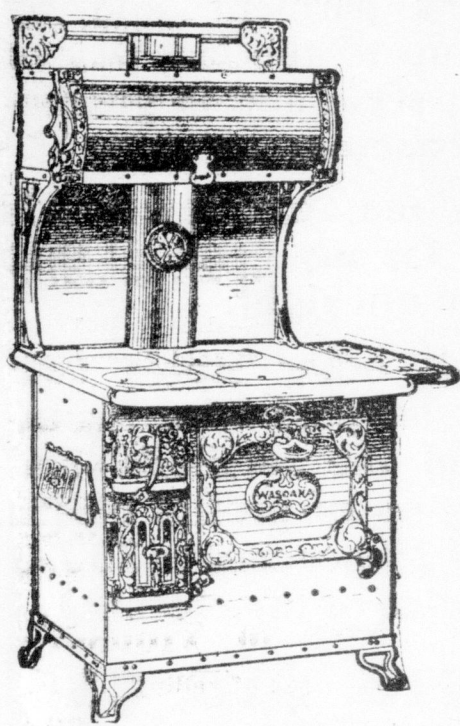

NEAR RIOT WHEN NEW LIQUOR BILL WAS CONSIDERED

All Sections Were Carried on a Close Vote of Tennessee Legislature.

INTIMIDATION CHARGED

Open Fight Was Feared as Gunmen Were Among the Spectators.

Nashville, Tenn., Sept. 25. — After another exciting day in the Legislature, in which the leaders of the political factions have banded charges that "gunmen" were being used to intimidate legislators, an agreement was reached late this afternoon to clear the Capitol of all spectators. The State Senate was not in session, and members of that body, city detectives, policemen and state officials not present on official business were included in the "request" to leave the Capitol and the State House grounds.

A Wise Precaution.

This action was taken as a precaution against a threatened open clash between the factions that are fighting over the so-called liquor law enforcement bills. The agreement to disperse the "gunmen" was reached soon after the afternoon session was called to order, when it was stated that a number of plain-clothesmen and police had been placed in the corridors. A committee was named to clear the State House in accordance with the agreement. Mr. McFarland, one of the members of the committee, assembled the spectators in the corridors and addressed them, stating that the steps decided upon were for the preservation of peace.

All Bills Passed.

Several spectators declined to leave unless assured that city detectives and other armed men obeyed the request. All the partisans of the opposing factions finally left the building and the House was a calm called to order. The regulars today continued their filibuster against the law enforcement bills. The bills, three in number, are designed to strengthen the state-wide prohibition laws. They prohibit the shipment of liquor into the state, prohibit its shipment within the borders of the state, and provide for action in criminal or civil courts to declare saloons public nuisances upon petition of ten taxpayers. All three of the measures passed the Senate by a close vote.

A Serious Charge.

At the morning session Rep. Bejach introduced a resolution censure John Yeaman, deputy game warden, to appear before the House for contempt. It being alleged that he had drawn a revolver yesterday when the House adjourned in an uproar. Late in the afternoon the resolution was voted down.

Representative McDade then presented a petition signed by fifty members urging Speaker Stanton to let the law enforcement bills come to a vote. The petition was spread on the journal. At 5:30 o'clock the House adjourned until 8 p.m., when local bills were taken up.

Bandits Hold Up Southern Express

Birmingham, Ala., Sept. 25. — Alabama's great southern train, No. 7, from Birmingham to New Orleans, was held up and robbed at Bibbville Station, three miles south of Woodstock, Ala., at midnight.

Engineer Daniels had stopped the train for a "red block" when robbers climbed in and ordered the fireman to uncouple the express car, which was carrying some distance down the track. After dynamiting the safe, the robbers reported to have been two masked men—ran the engine down the track several miles, putting the fireman off. Express Messenger Kelly was covered before he knew what was happening, and could not say what the losses would be, but thought they would be light.

MAY LOAN \$10,000.

BRITISH GOVT. IS UNDISTURBED BY CARSON'S THREATS

Refuses Absolutely To Martyrize Him by Taking Any Official Action.

LEADER BREAKING DOWN

In Poor Health, and Nearly Collapsed at Meeting in Ulster.

London, Sept. 26.—The Under-Secretary of the Board of Trade, J. M. Robertson, speaking at Newcastle last night, said that Sir Edward Carson's provisional government was an economic blunder and a practical impossibility, which could be ended by the British postoffice cutting it off from the rest of the world.

The under-secretary declared that Sir Edward Carson was not prosecuted for the reason that "the Government did not wish to make King Carson a Saint Carson."

Ignored In England.

Canon Founden and Rev. Dr. Wright are elected chaplains to the provisional government. A frank, unbiased review of the present situation brings the following conclusion:

While travellers who have recently been in Ulster declare that the temper of the Unionists there is unmistakably calmer and determined, there is in England not yet the faintest sign of general excitement. Everybody appears to have a vague impression that something or other will happen to straighten things out. Nobody attempts to say what it will be, but there are some months yet before even the parliamentary machine at Westminster is to get going again, let alone before home rule goes into the mill for the first time, and all sorts of unexpected things might turn up.

Affecting Labor.

Regarding Sir Edward Carson's present tour of speech-making, Fred Maddison, the labor member, writes the Times, declaring that Carson's elements are having a serious effect on labor opinion. The Times editorially agrees with Maddison, but adds that Carson's campaign is an unfortunate but unavoidable necessity in the circumstances of the case, adding after further reflection: "Carson and the Ulster Unionists have not yet resorted to violence."

This is exactly what the great bulk of the English public appear to have noted for themselves, and, therefore, they still observe the columns of print about present doings in Ulster with perfect equanimity. Not a single large public meeting in connection with the Ulster agitation has yet been arranged in England, and leading politicians on both sides are making holiday all over the world.

Sir Edward Ill.

The central authority called a private meeting at Ulster Hall, over which Lord Londonderry, in the absence of Sir Edward Carson, presided. Sir Edward, who is the leader of the Ulster Unionists, is ill, and last night nearly collapsed from the heavy strain under which he has been working for some time. The doctors ordered him to remain in bed for 48 hours to prevent a complete breakdown. Sir Edward's health has been poor for some time, and his recent activities exhausted him. He is now resting at Craigavon, but he declares he intends to attend the parade of the Belfast volunteers on Saturday.

MEETING DISCUSSES NEW I. O. F. RATES

Increases Are Attacked, and Defended by Toronto Members.

Toronto, Sept. 26.—About one hundred members of the Independent Order of Foresters met at Euclid Avenue Methodist Church last night to protest against the increase in rates, which go into effect on Oct. 1.

The meeting was very lively, due chiefly to the fact that none of the protesters knew exactly what they wanted, or intended doing, while another section desired to support the action of the chief executive. After nearly three hours' discussion, the meeting adjourned without any definite action being taken. Another meeting will be held on a date to be fixed by the chairman, Mr. Murray P. Watson, of Court Lisgar.

Many Objections.

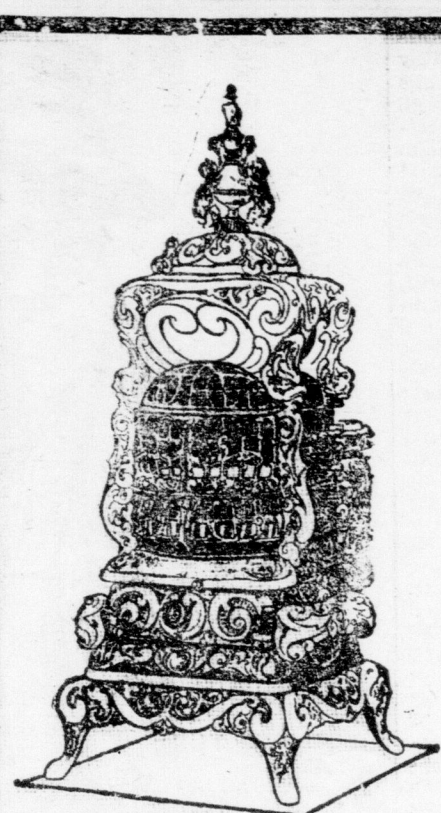
Mr. Watson, who convened the meeting, was not permitted to take the chair until other aspirants for the position had been rejected. After a number of members had voiced their objections to the increase and pointed out the hardships that would be inflicted upon many of the older members, Dr. D. A. Clark, assistant supreme physician, was given a hearing.

Defends High Rates.

Dr. Clark warmly defended the policy of the executive. He said they had been told by the Dominion Government that the department, by the Government of 26 states in the Union, and by a committee of the British Board of Trade that the order was actually insolvent, that for the protection of the present members of the order and in the interests of new members, an increase of rates was absolutely necessary. In 1908 there was a deficiency of \$55,000,000, which by an increase of rates had been reduced to \$23,000,000. Notwithstanding this increase in rates the deficiency had increased within the past five years to \$26,000,000. Now the Government from whom the order got its license to do business insisted that the financial condition of the order be brought up to the standard demanded by the act.

Governments Take Action.

These governments had sent them notice, 1, 1917, to reach 90 per cent of actuarial solvency. Unless they

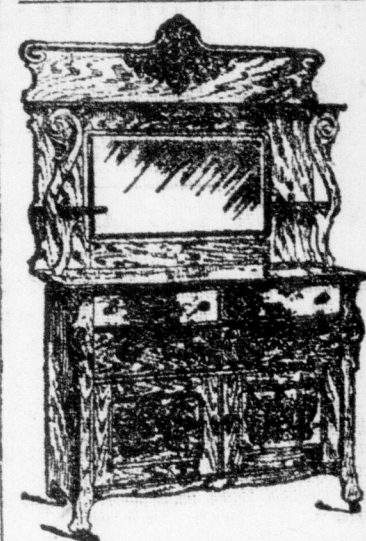

Shortage of Meat in England Also

Washington, Sept. 26. — Shortage of meat supply in England, as in the United States, is due to a considerable extent to the butchering of breeding stock, according to G. A. Bell, assistant chief of the division of animal husbandry of the department of agriculture, who has just returned from

four months' trip through Europe studying live stock conditions. Mr. Bell expressed the opinion that after Argentina, now the meat supply house of England and some other countries, had begun to fence her ranges and restrict the cattle territory, the world supply would shift to Africa.

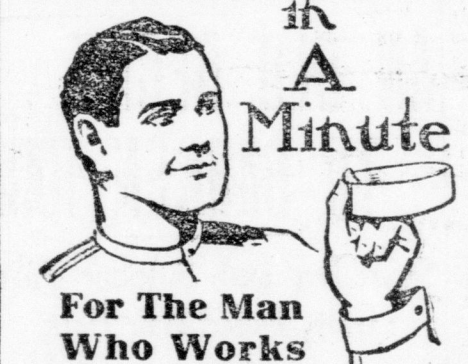
