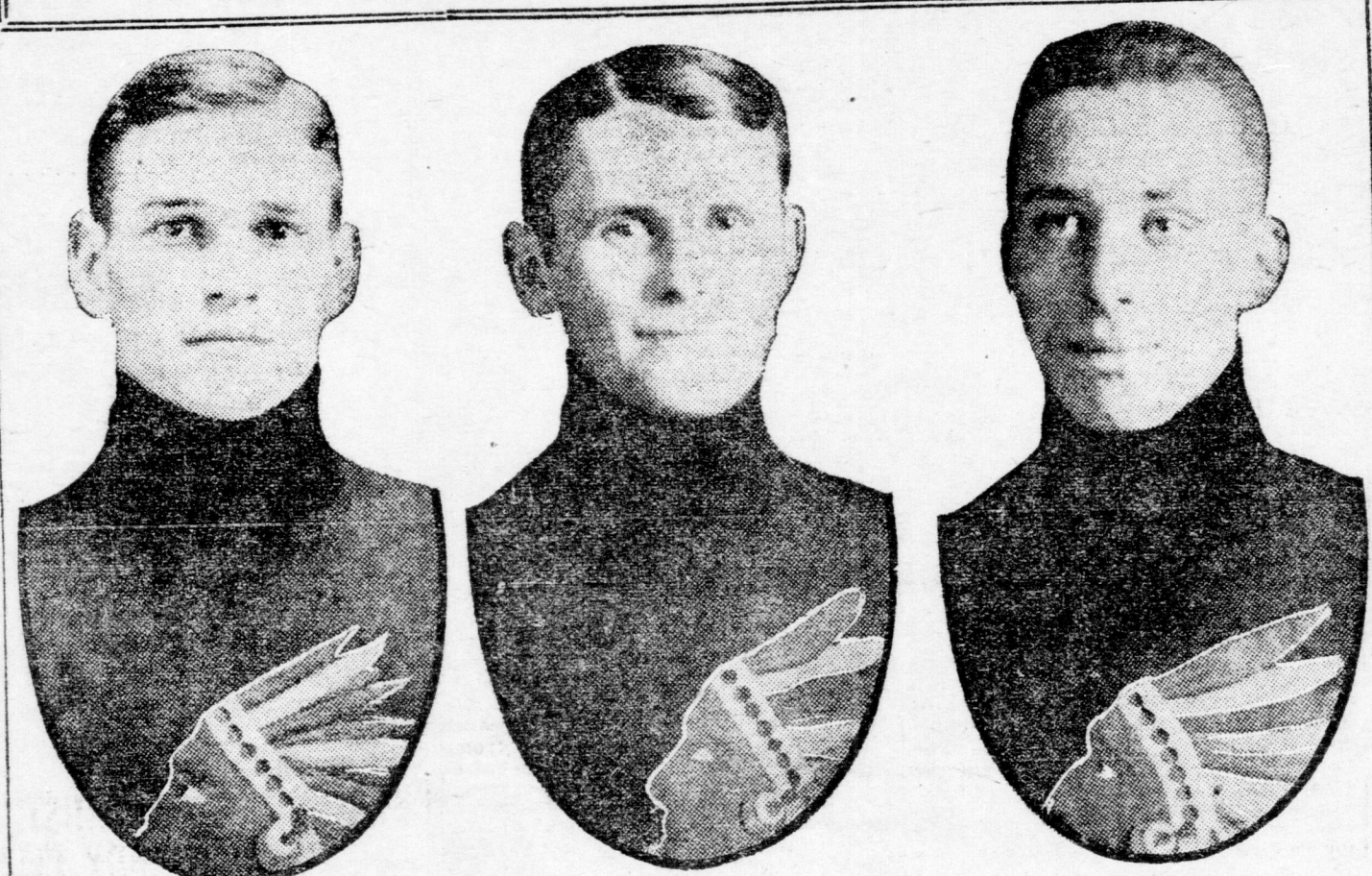

GRAND CIRCUIT DATES HAVE BEEN ANNOUNCED

Application to Place Windsor on the List Was Granted.

Pittsburg, Pa., Jan. 14.—The stewards of the Grand Circuit met here today, announced dates for meets on the circuit, in the different districts admitted New York and Windsor, Ont., to the circuit, and adopted a rule providing that teams with three stakes amounting to \$2,000 must afterwards compete in a class to which it is eligible by the low record it has made in any one of its winning races.

Applications for admission to the circuit were presented by the stewards of the Fourteen, New York City, Windsor, Ont., and Springfield, Ill. New York was admitted after Reading, Mass., already admitted, announced that it would surrender its dates to New York. Windsor was given the opening weeks of the circuit, and Foughkeepsie and Springfield were refused.

The rule providing that the horse winning \$15,000 in three stake races must compete in the class in which it made its lowest record does not refer to futurities for three-year-olds and under.

The stewards considered the "three heat system" of races. While this system was not adopted, it was recommended to all clubs in the Grand Circuit.

Under the "three-heat system" each heat is a race.

The stewards elected the following officers: H. K. Devereux, Cleveland, president; Fred Postal, Detroit, vice-president; and H. J. Kline, Cleveland, secretary.

The Grand Circuit was chosen for the next annual meeting of the stewards.

JOE RIVERS OUTPOINTED LEACH CROSS IN NEW YORK

Was Quicker and Steadier Than New Yorker All Through the Bout.

New York, Jan. 14.—Joe Rivers, the Mexican lightweight, outpointed Leach Cross, of this city, in a ten-round bout here tonight. Cross had the better of the first two rounds. While the New Yorker was showering right and left to the head in the first round, the Mexican slipped to one knee at the ropes, but was up in an instant, adopted blocking tactics and proved Cross' superior at fighting. In the second round Cross scored the only real knockdown of the bout, with a left hook under the jaw.

Rivers fought cleverly, and was so rapid in movement that Cross frequently could not find him, losing his eddy and missing, and becoming decidedly wild at some stages.

Rivers' showing in the last eight rounds earned him a victory by a comfortable margin.

Rivers tore in with left to the neck and

a right uppercut in the third. Cross coming back with a hard right to the head. The Mexican missed a swing a minute later and fell to the floor, but was up again immediately. A left jab brought blood from the Mexican's nose, angering him so that he plunked with rights to the body and lefts to the face, forcing Cross into a neutral corner.

Cross Was Wild.

Rivers became steadier and wild and became worried under Rivers' constant landing of left and right uppercuts, backing away at times. In the eighth round the Mexican fell again, tripping over Cross' foot in breaking from a clinch. Rivers then landed four rights and lefts to face and head without a return, and when the New Yorker again lost his range, Rivers came up under the East Sider's swings and jolted him heavily on the body.

In the tenth round Rivers rocked the local man's head with a hook to the jaw, which almost knocked Cross down. Cross staggered to the ropes. The final bell found the men in a fast mix-up, of which Rivers had the better.

The men weighed a fraction more than in 133 pounds at 8:45. They were to weigh in at 133, ringside.
