# ARRANGED FOR FRANCE

J. P. Morgan and Company Completing Deal-One For Britain Too.

[Canadian Press.] New York, March 30.—Bankers heard today that the arrangements virtually have been completed between J. P. Morgan & Co., and representatives of the French Government for the estabishment in this country of a \$50,000,000 redit for the benefit of France. It was understood that the financing would take the form of French treasury bonds issued for one year, bearing 5 per cent interest.

To Buy American Goods. Plans have been made to form yndicate of bankers headed by J. P. Morgan & Co. to underwrite the credit and it was expected that a public of fering of the French securities would

The funds derived from the sale of the bonds, it was stated, would remain in this country and be devoted to the purchase of American goods needed by

It was stated that the plans under which the credit is to be established here had been subnitted to Government authorities i Washington and had received their ap-
