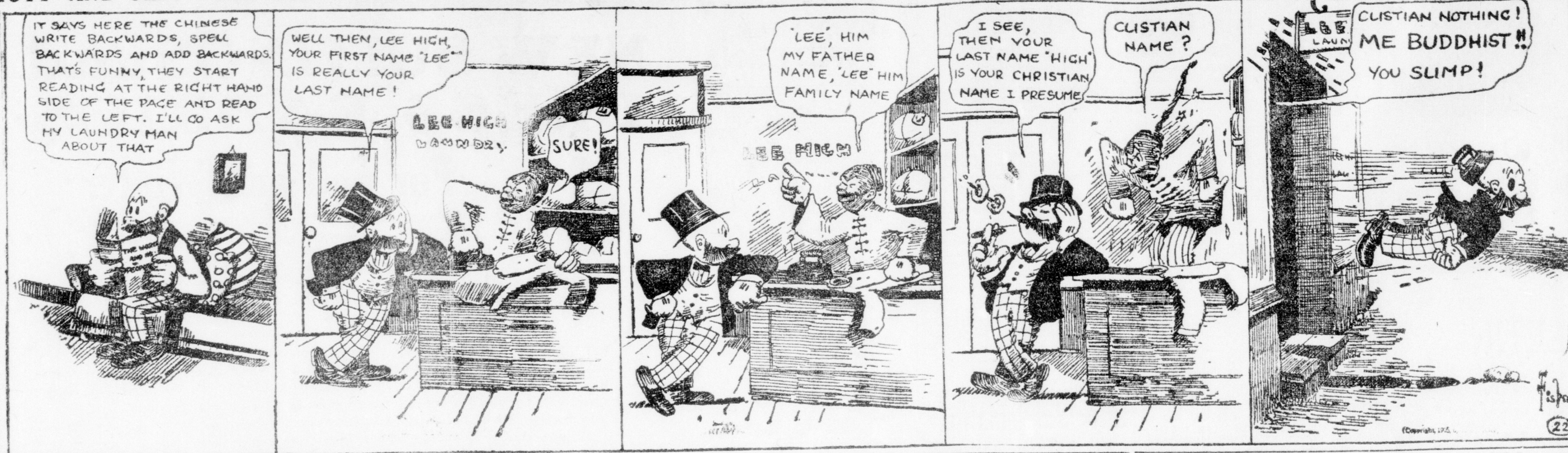

BRENNAN AND RIVET ARE IN FINE SHAPE FOR TONIGHT'S BOUT

Montreal Man Arrives Sunday and Looks Fit.

BOTH ARE CONFIDENT

Couple of Short Preliminary Bouts Have Been Added to the Bill.

Eddie Brennan of Cleveland and George Rivet of Montreal are all ready for their ten-round bout at the Masonic Temple tonight. Both are in the pink of condition, and are confident of victory. Rivet arrived in the city on Sunday from Montreal. He looks fit and fine. He has had seven bouts since he fought Brennan here on August 8. His last bout was on Friday night last at Quebec. Rivet has not much to say about how the battle will go, but he declares if Brennan is going to beat him, he (Brennan) will have to go the limit all the time.

Brennan is very confident. Brennan completed his training Saturday and certainly looks to be in much better condition than he did when he fought Brennan here on August 8. He has been doing a lot of road work and boxing, and he will be watched with a great deal of interest tonight at the Masonic Temple. Brennan was never more confident of winning than he is now. He predicts a knockout, and says Brennan will have to show some real class to prevent having the sleep punch put across.

Will Bring Some Good Ones. Promoter Tony Zuccato says that he intends to bring some of the world's best boxers and fighters here this winter, providing the attendance tonight justifies his belief that London wants good boxing. Brennan and Rivet are both well known in their respective cities, and are fighters of a type that men of their own weight.

Preliminaries Are Good. Among the preliminary bouts will be a couple of short added affairs, that promise well. In the first of these Kid Seymour and Mac Courage will appear for three rounds. In the next a youngster who styles himself "Goldie" Proctor will hook up with "Goldie" Proctor for five rounds. In the third, a local boy, who goes on in one of the preliminaries, has issued a challenge to meet any featherweight in Canada. A. T. Taylor, of the Y. M. C. A., will act as referee.

Sweden Will Send Four Skaters to U.S. This Winter

Will Compete in Different Speed Events Against American Champions.

New York, Sept. 25.—Four of Sweden's best skaters will compete in the United States during the coming winter, according to information brought by Thomas W. Cahill, secretary of the United States Football Association, who has just returned from Norway and Sweden with the American soccer football team. Mr. Cahill said that Oscar Mothsen, champion speed skater of the world, expects to sail for here in October and hopes to get matches with the American champions.

Three other Swedish skaters who told Mr. Cahill they would be over here this winter are Ulrich Salchow, champion figure skater; Mr. and Mrs. Meyer Persson, a team of figure skaters; and Miss Maria Johansson, also a figure skater.

NEW TRANSCONTINENTAL AUTOMOBILE RECORD

San Francisco, Sept. 25.—Ten days, 21 hours and 3 minutes was the new transcontinental round-trip automobile record hung up today when A. H. Patterson, who drove the car on the last relay of the long journey, arrived in San Francisco. The distance covered was 5,552 miles.

SHAMROCKS ARE WINNERS OF N. L. U. CHAMPIONSHIP

NEW WORLD'S RECORD FOR 120-YARD HURDLES

NEW YORK, Sept. 24.—Fred Murray, unattached, of San Francisco, made a world's record in the 120-yard hurdle event, with ten 3-foot hurdles at the annual games of the N. Y. A. C. here Saturday. His time, 14-2-5 seconds, was 2-5 seconds better than the record of George Taylor, made in 1883.

Old Hans Wagner Only One Left of Once Great Machine That Pittsburg Had in 1909

PITTSBURG, Sept. 24.—With George Gibson gone, only Hans Wagner remains as a remnant of the 1909 machine that won the National League pennant and then dominated Detroit in the world's series. Babe Adams, the hero of that series, was let go some months ago, and later Gibson, who caught every game against the American League champions, followed his battery mate.



Abstein First to Go. The first break in the membership of the crew came with the letting out of Bill Abstein, first-baseman, and Victor Willis, pitcher, in 1910. Abstein incurred the displeasure of his teammates by making a foolish play in the sixth game at Detroit. He disobeyed orders in coming in from third on an infield hit, and was an easy out at the plate. Fred Clarke vowed then and there that Abstein would not play on the Pirate team again, and he wasn't seen here after the series. Willis, but did not last long, and retired to his hotel in Delaware.

Two More in 1911. In 1911 Maddox was let go to the Kansas City team of the American Association, from whence he drifted to Louisville, then to Louisville, then to Louisville. Pat O'Connor was also sent to Kansas City in 1911, played with St. Louis Nationals in 1914, the Pittsburgh Federals in 1915, and Hartford, Conn., this year, up to June 8, when he was let go.

Some More Stars Fade. In 1912 Deacon Phillippe, a great standby for the Pirates in the champion days of 1901, 1902 and 1903, went to the United States League as manager of the Pittsburgh team, and is now running a cigar store in a hotel here. In the same year Tommy Leach and Albert Leifeld were exchanged with Chicago for King Cole and Artie Hoffman. Cole is dead. Hoffman is back with the Cubs, while Leifeld is pitching for St. Paul and Leach is managing Rochester in the International League.

In 1913 Howard Cannitz and Bobby Byrne were sent to Philadelphia in exchange for Cozy Dolan, a trade that Fred Clarke always regretted. Byrne is still with the Phillies, but Cannitz is through playing, while Dolan is in the American Association.

Biggest Hole of All. In 1914 came the biggest hole in the old machine, when Jack Miller, Chief Wagoner, Fred Robinson and Cozy Dolan were exchanged with St. Louis for Bob Harmon, Mike Morvey and Ed Konetchy. Every one knows how disastrously this turned out. Morvey played so poorly that he was released outright, and Konetchy jumped to the Federals. Ham Hyatt was let go to the St. Louis Cardinals by the waiver route in 1915. Fred Clarke resigned as manager of the Pirates, thus leaving only three original champions of 1909 on the roster—Wagner, Gibson and Adams—and now the sole survivor of the old days is Wagner.

CHIEF INSPECTOR OF SCOTLAND YARD DIES

Alfred Ward Recently Came to America to Get Lincolin.

[Canadian Press.] London, Sept. 25.—Alfred Ward, chief inspector of Scotland Yard, died in a hospital this morning. Inspector Ward had charge of the police investigation into several of the most sensational crimes of recent years. He visited the United States last May to bring back Ignatius T. Lincoln, the former member of Parliament and self-confessed German spy.

More Chance for Upset in National Than in American

Brooklyn Is Only a Game and a Half Ahead of Philadelphia.

Chicago, Sept. 25.—Pennant hopes were revived in a slight degree today for the Chicago and Detroit Americans, who won their games yesterday while Boston was losing to Cleveland. Boston, which has eight games yet to play, is two and a half games in front of Chicago and three ahead of Detroit. Chicago and Detroit still have five and four games, respectively, on their schedule.

The race in the National League is close, Brooklyn being only a game and a half ahead of Philadelphia, with Boston five games behind the leaders. There is more chance for an upset in the National League than in the American, as Brooklyn and Philadelphia each have eleven games before the season ends and Boston has fifteen. No games were played in the National League yesterday.
