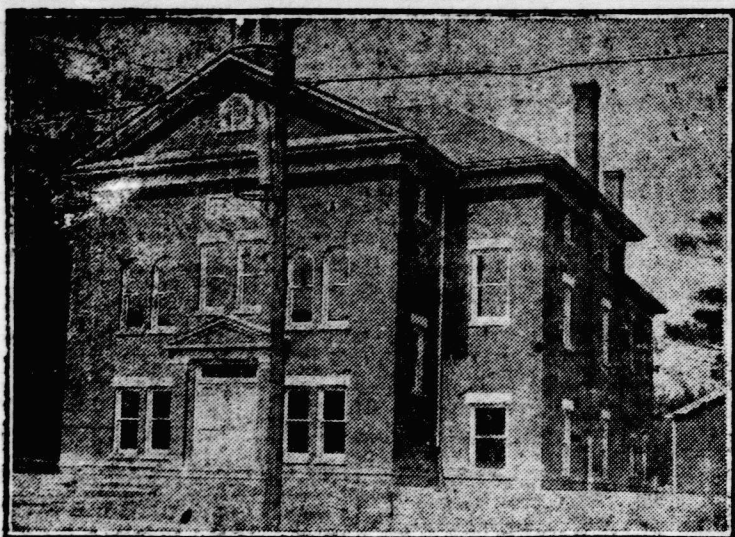


Blyth Memorial Hall

SUMMER SCHOOL FOR PUPILS WHO FAILED IN EXAMINATIONS

Principal Mooney's Proposal Favorably Received by Trustees.

That a summer school be established for those high school students who fail to pass their promotion examinations, is the hope of W. H. T. Mooney, principal of the Collegiate Institute, who unfolded his scheme before the members of No. 3 committee of the board of education yesterday afternoon, with gratifying results.

"I will not guarantee that success will be noted in every instance, but I believe that in the majority of cases the progress will be wonderful," said Mr. Mooney. "The summer school scheme is being successfully promoted in conjunction with the high schools in a number of places, Detroit and North Bay, for example, and lately in the public schools of Toronto.

"The problem of how to successfully handle the pupils who fail each year has always bothered us. We have a pupil who fails at the promotion test. He cannot be elevated to a higher grade, while on the other hand, if he is compelled to attend the class for another year, he is a source of additional worry. Furthermore, it is unfair to him."

Mr. Mooney explained that the probable cost would be roughly in the neighborhood of \$300. Two classes would be held, one for the first year pupils and one for the second year. One teacher would be allotted to each. The school would last six weeks, commencing after a rest of two weeks or so had been afforded the pupils after their June examinations.

The principal points out that at the most four or five subjects would be all that would be necessary to be reviewed. Most pupils who fail, he explains, do

so in a few subjects, such as algebra, French and Latin.

The committee unanimously agreed that the proposal was worthy of immediate attention, especially in view of the fact that the probable cost could not be considered as exorbitant.

HAVE THIRTY YEARS TO PAY FOR SEWER

Knollwood Park Ratepayers Given Time Extension by City Council.

Extending the term of years for payment from ten to thirty, the city council last night disposed of the Knollwood Park sanitary sewer controversy.

Claiming that the cost of the sewers in question, laid in the fall of 1920, was exorbitant, the ratepayers of Knollwood Park were awarded the decision by the court of revision. The city accordingly appealed the issue to the county court, where decision would not be forthcoming for several weeks. Upon consideration the Knollwood Park taxpayers agreed to a reduction of about half the amount in question, some \$5,529.

At last night's meeting the city council, however, rejected this amount as final, but agreed to an extension in time. Ald. Watkinson declaring that after a more recent consultation with the ratepayers, he would consider the matter closed.

The motion to withdraw the appeal against the decision of the court of revision was accordingly passed, as well as instructions being issued to authorize the city clerk to make the necessary changes in the assessment roll.

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CHURCHES SHOULD STAND BEHIND THE LEAGUE OF NATIONS

Public Librarian Reads Paper Before Anglican Clerical Association.

The need of the churches coming very strongly in behind the League of Nations was emphasized by Public Librarian Fred London in a paper read before the Anglican Clerical Association at Croydon Hall on Monday morning.

Mr. London's paper was prepared at the request of the association as a basis for discussion as suggested at the recent Lambeth Conference, and in addition to sketching in the historical background of the league and the circumstances of its organization, the speaker also discussed the league as a practical piece of machinery designed for a very complicated problem.

Mr. London pointed out that the hope of preventing wars had actuated many movements in the past. During the war allied statesmen had considered the possibility of a new era arising out of the war, when nations would unite to prevent the repetition of such a disaster. President Wilson, Lord Robert Cecil and General Smuts had all made important contributions. Yet when the peace conference had to deal with the subject, there was such need for haste that the actual League of Nations probably owed less to intellectual fore-runners than to the deep hunger of mankind for peace.

Not a Perfect Instrument.

The speaker was ready to admit that the league was no perfect instrument. There might be divine inspiration in the idea of peace, but the marks of human frailty were on the instrument. But it was no final document; it admitted of change. Indeed, Canada was suggesting a change at the present time—and in years to come the instrument would be gradually perfected. If the common people of the world stood behind it, the move to form a League of Nations Society in Canada was commended. There were enemies of the league in plenty; therefore its friends must start by it. And here was a plain duty for the church, as the bishops assembled at the Lambeth Conference had pointed out. The spectacle of the nations joining hands to preserve peace was Christian in its spirit, and might hasten the day when they would join hands on even a higher spiritual plane.

Dean Tucker, who presided, commended the form and the spirit of the paper, and an interesting discussion followed, in which many points relative to the league and its work were raised. A vote of thanks was tendered to the speaker of the day.

BERRY PRICES DOWN TODAY

Strawberries Drop to 27 Cents Per Box On Local Market.

The cool, dry weather prevailing around the district is responsible for a small market Tuesday.

Strawberries were not as plentiful as was expected on the local market Tuesday, although they took a drop from 30c to 27c and 30c retail, and from 25c to 23c and 27c wholesale. Some of the farmers seem to have more than they can handle, while others are losing their crops from a blight which is running through their plants.

Hay advanced from \$12 to \$13 and \$15, although there were only two loads on the market this morning.

Wheat took an advance from \$2.50 to \$2.75 per cwt., and from \$1.50 to \$1.65 per bushel.

Lettuce is the only garden product that showed a change in price, dropping from 50c and \$1 to 50c and 75c per dozen.
