TORONTO STOCK EXCHANGE.

Toronto, June 7. Practically every stock traded in on the Toronto Stock Exchange this morning suffered severely in a general selling movement which developed following the continued liquidation on the New York market. No exceptions were made, and declines ranging from small fractions to 2 points were registered.

Toronto Railway lost 1½ at 74½, and a similar decline occurred in Winnipeg Railway, which sold at 38. Canada Steamships common was 1½ down at 21¾, the preferred issue faring even worse, being 1¾ off at 55¾. Consumers' Gas lost 1 at 67.

Probably the worst selling took place in paper stocks. Spanish River lost 2¼ at 64¾, and Abitibi pursued its downward course, reaching 34½, a loss of 1 point.
