MANDATE AREAS ARE CONFIRMED

**Earl Balfour Wins Battle For
Jewish National Home in
Palestine.**

**Action of Council of League
of Nations Ends Three-
Year Controversy.**

LONDON, July 23.—Final con-
firmation was given the Palestine and
Syrian mandates yesterday by the
council of the League of Nations.
This means that the mandate sys-
tem of government becomes effective
throughout the world almost im-
mediately.

There remains for settlement only
certain minor points between France
and Italy, respecting Italian schools,

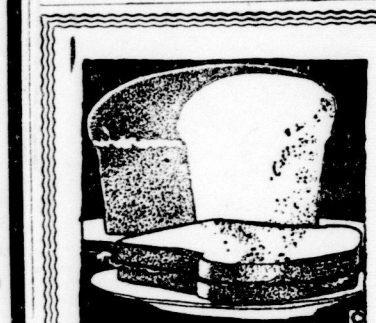

Geneva Serum For Tuberculosis Purchased By British Red Cross

GENEVA, July 23.—The British Red Cross, after investigation, has
decided to purchase the vaccine treatment against tuberculosis
originated by Henry Spahlinger, the Geneva biologist, and a contract
for the sale has just been signed in London. It is announced here.
The Spahlinger laboratory here will be continued and others
will be established. A number of Canadian patients, some of them
given up by physicians, are under treatment here and all are re-
ported to be showing improvement.

The Spahlinger discovery of a new treatment for tuberculosis
was announced in Paris early in 1914. Within the last year or two
it has attracted much attention, and purchase of the treatment by
the British government was reported as imminent more than a year
ago. The serum, at first very costly, can now be made as cheaply
as the ordinary smallpox vaccine, it is said.

The Earl of Balfour, Rene Viviani
and Marquis Imperiali, respectively
the delegates of England, France
and Italy, will make declarations on
Monday regarding the future policy
of their governments in the mandate
areas.

Urging the confirmation of the
mandates, Earl Balfour said yester-
day that their immediate adoption
was imperatively needed in order to
allay the agitation and unrest among
the different races in the mandated
regions.

He said that while the mainte-
nance of the holy places was of great
interest and importance to the out-
side world, they were of little con-
cern to the inhabitants of Palestine
and Syria.

Viviani Approves.

M. Viviani endorsed this view. He
said that France was anxious that
the mandates should be accepted im-
mediately. Marquis Imperiali, who
had contended for the definition of
the vatican's rights in the Holy
places, yielded on this point.

The action of the council marks
the culmination of three years' ef-
fort on the part of the league to in-
stitute the mandate system, in the
Pacific Islands, Central Africa and
Asia Minor. It is construed as a
victory for Earl Balfour and as giv-
ing further effect to the establish-
ment of a Jewish national home.

Mesopotamia Independent.

The mandate for Mesopotamia me-
chanically disappears with the crea-
tion by Great Britain of an inde-
pendent state in that country. There
remains the Syrian mandate, but
article 14 of the Palestine document
for the defining of the functions and
powers of the commission for the
custody of the holy places is now
revised.

The composition and competency
of the commission will be determined
by Great Britain before the next ses-
sion of the assembly in September.

It became known today that the
vatican approached the council con-
cerning the safeguarding of its in-
terests through Count de Leon, Span-
ish ambassador to France. It is prob-
able that Monsignor Cerretti, papal
nuncio in Paris, will be heard on the
claims of the holy see on Monday.

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OTTAWA CHARGES BECK SIDESTEPS

"Confusing Issues" Is Rail-
way Department's Mild
Opinion of Hydro
Chairman.

OTTAWA, July 23.—Sir Adam
Beck, chairman of the Ontario
Hydro-Electric Commission, is stated
by officials of the department of
railways and canals to be confusing
the issue in his statements in the
press with reference to the Central
Ontario power situation.

As between the department of
railways and canals and the On-
tario Hydro Commission, it is stated
at the department, there are at the
moment two questions, one relating
to a lease of power at Ranney's Falls,
which the hydro commission is ready
to develop, and the other as to short-
age of water in the Healey Falls-
Hastings reach of the Trent Canal.

There has been a sharp difference
of opinion as to what should consti-
tute a proper rental charge for the
Ranney Falls. This has led to con-
fusions between the hydro chief and
the minister of railways and canals,
and the latter has offered, if the
hydro will take out a formal lease,
to leave the question of what shall
constitute a fair and proper rental
to any one of three eminent Cana-
dian hydraulic engineers, whose
names were submitted to Sir Adam
Beck as long ago as July 13.

This offer on the part of the min-
ister of railways and canals has not
been acted on by the commission, but
it still holds good, and the public and
such municipalities as may be suffer-
ing from power shortage should un-
derstand the railway department
claims, that the situation is the di-
rect result of this demand on the part
of the hydro commission.

FORMER LIBRARIAN DIES.

TORONTO, July 23.—Avern Par-
doe, aged 77, Ontario parliamentary
librarian until his superannuation a
year ago, died yesterday at his sum-
mer home, Fairy Island, Lake Joseph,
Muskoka.

Prior to his appointment in 1895
Mr. Pardoe was a member of the To-
ronto Globe editorial staff. He was
a native of England.

**Members of 48th Highlanders
Regiment Head Cortege
in Toronto.**

**Impressive Ceremonies Mark
Tribute To War Hero Who
Died in London.**

TORONTO, July 13.—Signal tribute
to the late Colonel William F. Ma-
lone, who died in Westminster Hos-
pital, London, Ont., on Saturday, after
a very lengthy illness, arising from
his experiences in the war, was paid
by the exceedingly large attendance,
including the members of the 48th
Highlanders Regiment, at the im-
pressive military funeral service over
his remains, held in St. Thomas An-
glican Church, this afternoon.

The members of the 48th High-
landers Regiment turned out over 350
strong for the military funeral, un-
der command of Major Robert Cory,
D. S. O., parading both from the
armories to the church, and in the
military procession, headed by their
pipe and brass bands. The funeral
cortege, which proceeded to St.
James' Anglican Cemetery via Huron
and Bloor streets, and was witnessed
by several thousand persons, was
most affecting, the body of the late
officer, being surmounted by his
sword and military equipment, the
pipers and bandmen playing dirges.

A feature of the solemn Church
of England service over the remains of
the officer, conducted by Rev. W. R.
Ramsay Armitage, was the large
number of floral tributes and
wreaths, these including the ones
sent by the 48th Highlanders. To-
ronto, 41st Regiment, Owen Sound;
the Masonic Order and by the Owen
Sound City Council.

The burial service at St. James
Cemetery, which was conducted by
Rev. N. A. MacEachern, who was
the chaplain of the 134th Highlan-
ders Overseas Battalion, Toronto, was
most impressive, the "Last Post" be-
ing sounded by the buglers of the
48th Regiment, while a firing party
of 200 soldiers fired a "final volley"
over the grave of the departed war-
rior.

**FIND BLOOD-STAINED CAP
ON CHARING CROSS FARM**

**Police Seek To Connect Discovery
With Alleged Cession of
Clayton Croft.**

CHATHAM, July 23.—A blood-
stained cap on the Gus Noel Farm
at Charing Cross may fill in a few
links in the chain of evidence against
Clayton Croft, who is in the county
jail awaiting trial for the murder
of Noel. If there were any doubt in
the minds of the police as to the
truth of certain matters which Clay-
ton Croft is alleged to have con-
fessed, the county police now claim
that the discovery of the blood-
stained cap more or less confirms
them.

The discovery of the cap was made
in the horse stables a few days ago.
It is an old cap of green material,
and the stains on the front are of
human blood, the police claim. At
the back of the cap there is a rent
which indicates that it had been cut
by some sharp instrument.

**NORTHCLIFFE IS
IN CRITICAL STATE**

LONDON, July 23.—Lord North-
cliffe, owner of the powerful London
Times and many other British and
continental newspapers, is in the
most critical period of his recent
serious illness, according to an-
nouncement tonight.

The famous publisher's condition
was described by physicians in the
most recent bulletin as "giving rise
to grave anxiety." A fever, due to
infection from toxic poisoning, re-
mains unabated, the doctors de-
clared.

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**Population of Britain
Soars 491,652 in
Year.**

LONDON, July 23.—(Can-
adian Press.)—That the
year 1920 supplied some record
vital statistics is shown by the
annual report of the registrar-
general of England and Wales,
which states that births to-
talled 957,782, a new high
record.

Deaths numbered 466,130,
which is at the rate of 12.4 per
1,000 of population. This is the
lowest death rate since 1862,
when the population was only
half that of 1920.

The infant mortality was the
lowest recorded, the rate being
80 per 1,000 births.

Marriages totalled 379,952,
which is also a record. The
natural increase in population
was 491,652, the largest ever
recorded.

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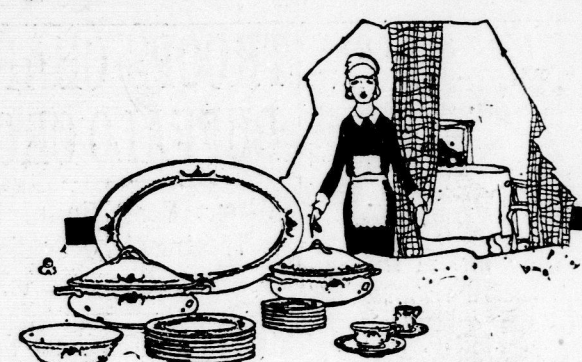
