SESSION ASKS PRINTING BE FREED OF SALES TAX

Delegates To Typographical
Conference Approve All
Executive Proposals.

SEEK CO-OPERATION

Burnet Pleas For Extensive
Organization Work—Mayor
Gives Welcome.

J. A. P. Haydon, M. C., Ottawa, president, presided at the initial business session yesterday afternoon of the 23rd annual convention of the Ontario and Quebec Conference of Typographical Unions being held in the Indian room of the Tecumseh House at which the chief items of interest were the speeches of delegates from fraternal unions. The meeting was addressed by George R. Burnet, Montreal, Canadian vice-president of the Printing Pressmen's and Assistants' Union; and E. A. O'Dell, Hamilton, Canadian representative of the Boot and Shoe Workers' Union. Communications were received from the following regretting their inability to be present, but wishing the conference every success in its deliberations: Chas. P. Howard, J. W. Hayes and W. R. Trotter, all of Indianapolis, president, secretary-treasurer, second vice-president, respectively, of the International Typographical Union; C. E. Kinskey, Newark, N. J., former representative of the I. T. U.; and Michael Powell, Ottawa, formerly of London, general superintendent of the Ottawa Journal. In his address before the conference Mr. Burnet declared himself as a strong supporter of co-operation. While believing in co-operation he expressed the opinion that the individual printer should be able to secure their ends by having their separate organizations, but there should be a strong entente for offensive and defensive actions. He expressed his appreciation of the measure of co-operation accorded him in his rounds by the officers of the Ontario and Quebec Conference of the Typographical Union. "We would get better and quicker results," declared Mr. Burnet in conclusion, "if the printing and typographical unions united their efforts in an extensive and intensive organization campaign, and as far as our organization is concerned we are only waiting for that invitation to jump right in and set to work."

Mr. O'Dell also emphasized the great need for co-operation among the various trade unions, and characterized it as the keynote of organized labor's success. The speaker pointed out that organized labor had been the subject for a number of attacks in the past, and that the time for these attacks, in his opinion, had not entirely passed. "Though we have come through pretty well," he said, "it is not out of the woods yet, and it is up to us to stick together."

The present condition of unemployment existing throughout the country was at the root of considerable of the difficulties of organized labor unions Mr. O'Dell said. The "open door" policy of the Canadian government with regard to immigration was cited as the cause of considerable unrest and unemployment. The report of the committee on officers' reports, consisting of A. H. Wheatley, London, Walter Robertson, Ottawa, and W. J. Mountjoy, Hamilton, has thus far received the cordial and unanimous indorsement of the delegates in its report on the extended report and list of recommendations submitted by the executive committee.

Approve Report. Included in the list of recommendations which were indorsed by the conference are the following: That the question of the installation of multiplex machines in printing offices in such large numbers since the fight for the 14-hour week began be the subject of an investigation and report by a special committee, the report to be introduced at the forthcoming convention of the international Typographical Union in Toronto in August.

That the government be petitioned to abolish the sales tax so far as the printing industry is concerned, and that a customs tariff, amounting to 5 per cent, be imposed on all printed matter, plates, matrices, electrotypes and stereotypes entering Canada from the United States; and that a conference be called in September to meet in London in conjunction and coincident with the meeting of the Trades and Labor Congress of all the allied printing unions in Canada.

SPEEDY TRIAL DESIRED BY ALLEGED BANDIT

Lewis Austin Held On Charge

Toronto, June 12.—Lewis Austin, who was extradited from the United States to stand trial on the charge of robbing the Royal Bank of Canada at Mount Forest in December, 1922, has made application for a speedy trial before Judge Spotton at Quebec next Thursday. Austin has been in custody for some months awaiting trial.

EXPECT UNION BILL IN HOUSE MONDAY

"EAT PLENTY AND REDUCE AS WELL"

Birmingham Doctor Has Good
News For Fat People—
Addresses Session.

Special to The Advertiser by a Staff Correspondent. Chicago, June 12.—If you are fat, you can grow thin, and at the same time eat plenty of good food and enjoy life. This cheerful news for heavyweights was delivered to the American Medical Association at today's session of the annual convention of the association here today by Dr. James S. McLeister of Birmingham, Ala. "The effort of many obese people," said Dr. McLeister, "to avoid all starchy foods and to eschew all sweets is without reason. Carbohydrates are the source of energy for the maintenance of body temperature and, in overwhelming measure, for the production of work. Not only are simple sweets, when credited with their proper caloric value, of no harm, but when taken at the proper time they will permit the patient to rest satisfied with a smaller quantity of food. If we would hold the patient down to a minimal intake and at the same time satisfy him, we should always add to the heavy meal a little dessert."

"Enough food to satisfy" was the slogan, with emphasis on food that tends to stick to the ribs. "It is not necessary to resort to freak diets," said Dr. McLeister, "in order to accomplish a reduction in weight." He urged finally a warning against too rapid a reduction, considering three to six pounds a month, continued sufficiently long, as a satisfactory speed. In the same section, special attention was given by the physicians to the use of water in the treatment of various diseases in the forms of baths and packs. (Copyright, 1924, in U. CREDIT COLLECTIONS IN U. S. STILL SOUND

Trade Report Submitted At
National Association of
Credit Men Convention.

Associated Press Despatch. Buffalo, June 12.—Despite slowing up of trade conditions, credit and collections in the United States continue sound, it was declared in a report submitted today the 25th annual convention of the National Association of Credit Men, meeting in conjunction with Canadian credit men here. The report, compiled from summaries submitted by 15 trade groups represented at the convention, showed a general slowing up in business conditions, with however a survey of prospects for the next six months presenting a hopeful outlook.

Goitre Caused by Lake Water

Large Percentage of School
Children Suffering With Disease

Winnipeg, June 12.—Shoal Lake water is held responsible for the goitre afflicting a large percentage of Winnipeg school children, according to Dr. Duncan McRae, supervisor of the Manitoba health survey. His report reveals that approximately 50 per cent of children between the ages of 12 and 14 years, examined, were suffering from goitre. The condition Dr. McRae attributes to the lack of iodine, which is peculiar to snow water such as obtained from Shoal Lake. The condition, he points out, can be corrected by introduction of this element into the reservoirs and into food generally.

SIGHT-SAVING CLASS WILL BE INAUGURATED

Definite Promise From Department of Education Is Received.

Definite promise from the department that an oculist will be here the first of next week to start a "sight saving" class has been given School Inspector V. K. Greer. At the present time school nurses are narrowing down a list of some 90 pupils whose sight has not been up to standard. From 12 to 2 of the most needy cases will be treated by the government expert so that they may go ahead with their studies and examinations without any hold-up. The request for the oculist was made some time ago and the inspector has just received definite announcement of acceptance.
