**Company Has Received Dominion Charter**  
Mr. Claude Forsyth, of the John Forsyth Company, is interested in the incorporation of a company which controls the North American continent, for the manufacture of Carburetors and Vaporizers, which will use kerosene oil for motive power, instead of gasoline. Previous to this year, they have confined their operations to trucks, but the company expects to manufacture them for pleasure cars as well. The company has been incorporated under a Dominion charter, with a capital stock of \$100,000 with the head offices in Berlin.

**Practical Hints For City Tillers**  
Pointers for Amateur Gardeners—What to Do and When to Do It—Seasonable Hints.  
What an extremely ugly and altogether unnecessary thing is the tall board fence division between back yards. It blots out the sunlight, creating dampness and mould. It prevents the free circulation of air and, worst of all, it renders comparatively useless for gardening purposes at least one-third of the average back lot. What is it there for? Of what use is the wooden barrier, rotting and tilting in many cases? It serves no practical purpose whatever. The board fence falls far short of giving the privacy, the object, no doubt, for which board fences were originally devised.  
In days gone by, when the one-story structure was the prevailing style of architecture, perhaps it served to satisfy a longing for seclusion. With the coming of the more lofty house its usefulness in this regard has disappeared, and there is no longer any need for its existence, while there are a hundred and one reasons why it should be banished from off the face of the globe.  
Time was when front lawns were walled up on either side in a similar manner and when mean-souled individuals reared sky-high barriers just for "privacy." Happily such narrowness has disappeared, and to-day well-kept lawns sweep away for whole blocks without anything like a barrier intervening. We have broadened out at the front of the home, why not at the rear of the home as well? A General Improvement.  
With the opening up of the front premises has come a vast improvement in tidiness of lawns and a greater desire to beautify the front surroundings with trees, shrub, vine and flower bed. With the lawn-dividing fence removed, people who live in "pair" houses have even learned to agree to a single walk from the street line, branching only to the respective steps. Floor to ceiling verandah division wall has also given way to neater and more neighborly shoulder-high division, and, in many cases, a mere rail.  
The ugly board fence in the rear should and will come down. It only remains for a couple of broad-minded, sensible, immediate neighbors on each locality to get together and start the ball rolling by replacing the board fence with a neat wire fence, whose down will tumble the ugly like nine-pins for blocks each way. This is no idle dream. It has been tried in more than one section of the city with excellent results.  
Why down in the east end there is a beautiful avenue where pretty back garden-steps away for hundreds of yards, with not a wooden fence to mar the view. At the "other end" an old-fashioned individual who had been bred in narrow quarters, elsewhere, walled in his lot with high board fences. He got in very wrong

with the whole neighborhood from the start and thus sacrificed the joy of true neighborliness which the people of the boardless community enjoy.  
Far from promoting ill feeling the wire fence has an entirely opposite effect. Neighbor chats with neighbor through the wire mesh or calls across lot. Gardening experiences are swapped and garden produce compared. Roots of this or that flowering plant are exchanged or handed across as gifts, each vying with the other in their anxiety to be neighborly in the true sense of the word.  
**Prejudices Vanish Also.**  
The wire fence not only broadens the view of the landscape, but it broadens the mind as well. With the board barrier gone less real barriers are forgotten and the wonder is that it or they were ever allowed to exist. Once down, down forever, will prove the ease in regard to the board fence and the sooner means are undertaken to that end the sooner will false prejudices vanish.  
It costs surprisingly little to replace a board fence in comparison with the advantage gained. One citizen who has tried it declares that he got enough kindling out of the old boards to pay for the wire. In this case the posts were cut down to the level of the wire used, straightened up and trimmed off. The old scantling was also used to support the wire, the whole being treated to a couple of coats of good paint afterwards. He is delighted with the result, especially as others are quickly following his example.

Truly it may be said of the board fence, that "it's here because it's here." There is no other excuse for its being here. With its removal trees will bloom more beautiful than ever and even the grass will take on a more healthy hue, because of the increased amount of air and sunshine that will be permitted to reach it. With board fences down the untidy ones will be shamed into cleaning up. Neglected lots will be cared for and noxious weeds will disappear. The city will become more beautiful and infinitely more attractive as the
