THOOPS EXPECTED. THE INDIANS WELL ARMED. The present outbreak in the North west has brought before the attention of the authorities the fact that the Indians are much better pro-vided with arms than there was any idea of. In the examinations which have been made from time to time by Mounted Police officers into In-dian arms and stores they have seldown been able to find any guas of improved pat-tern in their possession. It is evident now, however, that the Indians have for some time been tolerably well supplied with rifles of the best manufacture, and that they have carefully concealed this fact from the authorities. In-formation now comes to hand that in many of the bands a considerable proportion of the In-dians have demington rifles of the best pattern, which have probably been supplied to them by traders. With a view of remedying this state of things it is understood the Government will intraduce a fill during the present session mak-ing the furnishing to Indians of arms or am-munition an offence pualsable by fine or imprisonment. A Brandon desoatch says Capt. Whitelaw, who has just come in from Turtle Mountains, reports half-breeds uneasy. They sucked Per-ret's house, a farrier in the district. Indiaes are coming in from the American side in twos and threes, and assembling at Wood Mountain. Captain Whitelaw has been commissioned to get arms for the Home Guards. SASKATOON LOOTED. A despatch from Medicine Hat says it is re-ported that Indians looted Saskatoon on the Temperance Colonization Company's land, cleaning the south of provisions, but not molesting the southers.


