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THE MASSACRE.

Fourteen Persons Known to Have Been Murdered, AND PROBABLY MANY MORE.

Indians Attack Fort Pitt, and Several Settlers are Killed.

FROM THE NORTH WEST. Winnipeg, April 10.—(Special.)—The people of Winnipeg were startled this morning by the news of the Indian massacre at Frog Lake, where fourteen persons were reported to have been murdered.

Among the victims, in addition to those whose names have been mentioned in previous reports, were Mr. W. H. BARTER, a settler, and Mr. A. H. BARTER, a settler.
