Eastern States. Chicago, Nov 24—A special dispatch reports that 54 miles of the Denver railroad is completed. Tract laying is progressing a mile and a half daily.

A Republican special says that the President expresses himself unfavorably opposed to the renewal of the treaty with Canada and declines consideration of the subject.

The Spanish gunboats were not set adrift yesterday, owing to the non-completion of the necessary documents for libeling. Affidavits have been made by Alairo, of the Cuban Junta, who charges that the gunboats are intended to make war not only on an established government in Cuba, but also in Peru. The gunboats are still under surveillance of the navy and will probably be taken possession of by the Marshal to-day.

The Junta state that if they can do more than secure the detention of the gunboats until Congress meets they will be content, as they feel assured that among the first acts of Congress will be one for the recognition of Cuba. Letters received by the Junta from Havana state that five Spanish war vessels are about to proceed from Cuban waters to New York.

New York, Nov 25—Albert D. Richard, son, war correspondent, and for a long time attached to the New York Tribune, was shot and fatally wounded by Paul Macfarland, a lawyer, between whom there had existed for a considerable time past an estrangement caused by an intimacy by the former with the latter's wife.

Deseret, Nov. 23—The North Pacific Railroad Company's Convention reassembled to-day at Saguaw. A number of speeches were made, favoring the construction of the northern route to the Straits via Mackinaw and Pigeon Sound. A long series of resolutions were adopted, favoring the project, and asking Congress to extend Government aid in constructing the railroad.

Ocala, Fla., Nov. 24—The Senate to-day adopted a resolution releasing state aid to railroads.

Columbus, Ga., Nov. 24—The legislature was convened yesterday. The governor's message was read to-day. It speaks cheerfully of the financial condition of the state, and recommends that interest on the debt be paid in specie.

Washington, 24—The entire speech of Gladstone at the Lord Mayor's dinner is just received and is regarded as a friendly sentiment in a satisfactory manner to us; this view is strengthened by letters from distinguished sources in England, making requests and suggestions indicative of continued improvement in the state of feeling on the subject and strongly expressing a desire that the dispute be promptly adjusted.

There has, however, been no official action but the aspect leads to the belief that negotiations will be terminated at an early day.

Cuba. The last information from Cuba concerning the insurgents shows a decline in their numbers. They are not in possession of a single town, having been obliged to abandon even Guayama, the seat of the Céspedes Government. There is no doubt that several months ago General Jordán proposed to surrender to the Spanish authorities, not by his own accord, but that of his men from the United States who were forced to take the field in battles and in consequence comparatively few American soldiers survived, but the Céspedes prevented the communication of Jordán's offer, who, unable to leave the country, was transferred to the staff of Céspedes.

New York, Nov. 24—The Spanish authorities have been advised to send a commission to the United States to negotiate the evacuation of the island.

Portland, Nov 27—The steamer Moses Taylor sails for San Francisco this evening. Weather clear and breezy.

Coming Home.

Doctor Helmeke is a whale at figures. After three weeks devoted to abstract arithmetic he has arrived at the conclusion that we are entitled to expect from Canada the modest sum of \$150,000 for our "little business," as he facetiously terms it. We ventured to think that the colony has a right to expect a great deal more. Most Confederationists have claimed more. Three weeks' hard figuring has brought the Doctor to assert: "I am of opinion that Confederation does not mean simply responsible government and the change of one set of officers for another set—it means a great deal more." Is it possible that the Doctor has only now made the astounding discovery? "Care must be taken," says the Doctor, "that the Dominion government does not take for its own use the present revenues of this colony. We want more money than we have. So say we. So have we been saying for months. But, how is this 'care' to be taken? By indulging in columns of distorted facts and hypothetical figures, or by all parties, barring the dry bones of political issues long dead and joining in a cordial effort to secure the most favorable terms before we are kicked in the future for gain in money from British Columbia." So we say. So we have said all along. So Canadian Cabinet Ministers have long said. Has the Doctor only now made the discovery? A perusal of Doctor Helmeke's last letter induces us to indulge in the belief that he has fairly succeeded in "figuring" himself round to the right side of the great question, and recognizing in him the leader of a party in Victoria hitherto offering a blind and unconditional opposition to what every intelligent thinker must long have regarded as inevitable destiny.

We shall expect to see that gentleman employing his influence, talents and industry in the more hopeful and patriotic work of securing favorable terms while yet there is time and opportunity. In conclusion, we once more appeal to all parties to be wise, and to be wise in time—to come together on common ground in pursuit of common interests. We are now called upon to lay the foundations of future empire, to act for posterity as well as for ourselves. Let the bundle of sticks be bound together for once.
