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

Crae, president, Otto Klotz, vice-president, W. Edwards, secretary, Rev. Father Hairis, Rev V. Clementi, Mr. Allan (Paris), Eras-tus Jackson and Mr. Kay. The deputation sought amendments to the act relating to mechanics' institutes. The features coming within Mr. Wood's department were first presented. 
