THE BUSINESS OUTLOOK.

The situation in commercial circles is not full of sunshine, or rather quite a number of dark colored clouds are in the sky.

What then is the outlook. The outlook is encouraging, but it is a decided change in the weather, we must have spring, before any silver lining can be seen to the clouds.

A CANADIAN FLAG. At the opening of the present parliament the leaders of both political parties were careful to pose as Canadians.

Now if we are all true Canadians and love our country, do we not want something to symbolize that country?

It is true there is a dominion flag now, but it is a mere nondescript. It is neither English nor Canadian.

There is another point upon which we all agree, and that is that it is wholesome and beneficial to foster Canadian national sentiment.

Under the auspices of the present government the 1st day of July was made a holiday, the Royal Canadian society was inaugurated by the present governor-general.

There is one thing that would encourage and entice that feeling more than to see a Canadian flag flying over our heads?

It may be said that no flag would be allowed to a dependency. But it is allowed, and a more distinctive symbol is allowed and used among the dominion colonies of Australia than we have in confederation.

Canada, Sweden and Norway, though under one government have separate flags, Belgium has a flag, though it is only a quarter neutral ground, and Egypt, though only a province of Turkey before the late war, had a flag of its own.

But what is the use of talking of custom.

We simply want it and we ought to have it. We got responsible government and confederation because they were necessary and we ought to have a flag now because it is necessary and expedient.

The timid souls can hold themselves in peace, nothing is wanting but an inferior place for our ensign below the imperial standard and the allowance of its use by our mercantile navy like the mercantile ensign used by every other nation.

OUR NEWSPAPERS. There is a certain amount of mad competition among the Canadian newspapers. They are nearly all too large and they are, many of them, spending more money than they can afford.

What people want is less paper, better and improved printing. The model paper of Canada is a little sheet, letter size, printed in nonpareil, with no display advertisements, a model of neatness, and hailing from that far away outpost, Edmonton in the Northwest.
