New York, Oct. 28.—The old Dominion steamship Wyanoke, which arrived here from Norfolk to-day, reports that yesterday, off the Delaware Capes, the schooner J. G. Morse of Portland, Me., was speken dismantled and disabled. Her captain said the larger part of his crew had been washed overboard and his vessel was unable to reach port. The mate had died of exposure. The captain and two sailors were the only ones on board and they were all sick and scarcely able to work. Captain Humphrey of the Wyanoke offered to take the schooner in tow but he schooner's captain declined his offer. He asked that enough men be given him to take his vessel into port. Captain Humphrey was unable to comply with the request. A life boat was sent with provisions to the schooner but the sea was so rough that the attempt to reach her was abandoned and the vessel was left to her fate.
