Valuable Silk Train Passes Through Watford

An unusual shipment by rail pass ed through here on Saturday, when two trains, loaded with silk from Japan, travelling via Seattle and Chicago for New York and other Eastern points, were expeditiously handled. The value of the silk in the two trains was about \$4,000,000. It is the first shipment of its kind to pass through here. Special efforts to guard the valuable cargo from injury enroute were taken and unusua efforts to make good time proved very successful. Allowed five hours to make the run to Buffalo, one train made it in 4 hours and 41 minutes and the other in the astonishingly fast time of 4 hours and 13 minutes.

The shipment from Japan was loaded in Seattle on the Chicoga & Northwestern Railway and at Sarnia it was taken over by the Canadian National Railways. One train went National Railways. 
The little, patient man at the window, who has a smile for everyone and is courtesy itself, estimated to-day that he had sold tickets to nearly 3,000,000 people since he took the
