Valuable Silk Train Passes
Through Watford

An unusual shipment by rail passed through here on Saturday, when two trains, loaded with silk from Japan, travelling via Seattle and Chicago for New York and other Eastern points, were expeditiously handled. The value of the silk in the two trains was about \$4,000,000. It is the first shipment of its kind to pass through here. Special efforts to guard the valuable cargo from injury enroute were taken and unusual efforts to make good time proved very successful. Allowed five hours to make the run to Buffalo, one train made it in 4 hours and 41 minutes and the other in the astonishingly fast time of 4 hours and 13 minutes.

The shipment from Japan was loaded in Seattle on the Chicago & Northwestern Railway and at Sarnia it was taken over by the Canadian National Railways. One train went over the Stratford division, the other through Watford and the London division.

Missing Michigan Pastor
Found; Branded "KKK"

Battle Creek, Mich., July 13.—Rev Oren C. VanLoon, pastor of Berkeley Community Church, near Detroit, who has been missing from his home for eleven days, was found here yesterday suffering from heat, exhaustion and insufficient nourishment and with the letters K.K.K. three inches high branded between his shoulder blades. To-day he is at a hospital in a serious condition, apparently ignorant of any of the events that have transpired since his disappearance. Rev. VanLoon on several occasions has spoken from his pulpit against the KuKlux Klan, and his friends said he had received a number of threatening letters. A doctor who treated the pastor, reported to the police that in his opinion the three K's had been burned into Rev. VanLoon's back by hot metal. A mysterious telephone call in a woman's voice led to the finding of Rev. VanLoon. She refused to give her name.

Has Sold Tickets To
3,000,000 People

Veteran Employee of Ferry Office at Sarnia Marks 85th Birthday.

Sarnia, July 11.—William Ruddock, born in Warwick Township, July 11, 1836, ticket-seller at the ferry office, Sarnia, is 85 to-day and spent the day selling transportation over the St. Clair.

The little, patient man at the window, who has a smile for everyone and is courtesy itself, estimated today that he had sold tickets to nearly 3,000,000 people since he took the job 20 years ago.

Mr. Ruddock is a veteran of the Civil War and in 1864 fought at Petersburg, where he was left on the field as dead. He fought for the North with the Michigan sharpshooters and was in the battles of the Spotsylvania, the latter the bloody affair in which the dead had to be removed to allow the living to pass; Cold Harbor, Turkey Ridge and Weldon. Mr. Ruddock early in life left Lambton County for Chicago and later came back to Port Huron, where he was compelled following the war to take a light job.

Mr. Ruddock sees a story in every ticket purchase, and he remembers a man who pushed a \$5 gold piece through the window and hurried on. When he called him back the man became annoyed and his language was anything but choice. He insisted that he had paid his passage without being told that he hadn't. When he gave him his gold piece he asked the man for a nickel. The man walked away with a ashamed face and two weeks later came and gave Mr. Ruddock a cigar. He said he had come 25 miles to put himself right.

On Monday, July 14th, the rate-payers of Arkona will vote on a by-law to raise \$15,000 for the erection of a two-room continuation school.

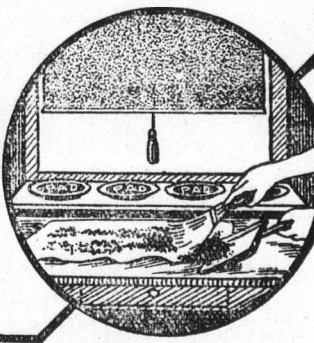
