They offered to assume \$10,000,000 of the island's debt; to give a yearly subsidy for local purposes of \$500,000; and to assist in completing the railway across the island, to the extent of granting a subsidy of \$6000 a mile to the unfinished portion of it. The \$5,000,-000 more which it would take to complete their railway system would bring their total debt up to an average of \$100 per head. That is, the Newfoundlanders are willing to throw in their lot with us providing we will at the very start assume obligations for them amounting to an average of \$100 for every man woman and child in the entire island. They want this in addition to a subsidy nearly twice as large per head as that now given to the other provinces. Most of our readers will agree with us that union with Newfoundland upon such terms would not learn without any regret whatever that the negotiations for union have terminated with-

out any result being likely to follow. The present generation of Newfoundland's politicians is responsible for about all of the island's present financial troubles. These men have rivalled the prodigal son of Scripture in their extravagance and recklessness, thinking no doubt that when the end of it all came they could throw themselves, debt and all, upon the dominion. Sir William Whiteway's recent declaration, that he was always in favor of confederation with Canada seems to leave little doubt upon that point. It would have been better for them had they discovered their mistake a little earlier, before their affairs became quite so desparate as they now appear to be.

In the one item of subsidy the terms offered are much more generous than those granted to any of the other provinces on joining the dominion. This province with a population of 450,000 receives a subsidy from the dominion treasury of but \$432,813 yearly, and a little over \$52,000 of that is for interest on funds to the credit of the province at Ottawa. Newfoundland has a population of about 200,000, and she has been offered a subsidy of \$500,000 yearly, or much more than this province gets although possessing more than twice the population.


