YARMOUTH SHIPPING AND FISHING NEWS

Yarmouth, Dec. 28.—Several of the larger craft of Yarmouth's fishing fleet are being made ready to start halibut fishing very early in the New Year. The Patrick and Michael, Capt. William Murphy, will probably be the first to get away and it is now expected she will sail on her first trip to the grounds on or about January 10th. The W. G. Robertson is another and she is now receiving some necessary work about her rigging, etc., in order that she may also be ready about the same date.

The Barrington Passage schooner, Thomas and Robert, which has been fall fishing out of this port, will go to Shelburne or Liverpool for the winter months. Captain Ansel Snow, who has been in charge of the vessel during the fall, has returned to Digby, and Captain Peter Cornu, Yarmouth South, is now skipper. Captain Thomas Worthen, her owner, was in Yarmouth looking after his vessel's interests and has returned to his home, Barrington Passage.

BRIDGETOWN'S PROSPERITY

Local Industries Running Full Time. Building Boom Anticipated

(From The Halifax Herald)

Bridgetown and the surrounding Annapolis Valley has had a prosperous 1921, considering business conditions throughout the entire world. The apple crop, notwithstanding the extremely dry season, was an extra large one. The hay crop was about 25% below normal while the potato crop in the Annapolis Valley was about 50% with vegetables and all roots in about the same proportion. Bridgetown is beginning to receive a lot of outside advertising brought about by a good local paper which is endeavoring to reach out for, and is obtaining considerable circulation outside of Annapolis county by good correspondence in the Halifax Herald's "Glancing Over Nova Scotia" page and other provincial dailies. This is felt by the real estate men and others, who are receiving applications from a class of desirable residents, who wish to move here, with the result that building operations, which have been very quiet since 1917, are now picking up quite rapidly and indications point towards quite a boom in the spring, some half dozen modern dwellings now being already contracted for, including a private residence for Mr. H. B. Hicks, of the firm of J. H. Hicks & Sons, Bridgetown's well-known builders and contractors.

A few days ago both M. C. Denton and M. A. Condon, of the firm of Denton & Condon, building contractors of Digby and Kentville, were in town looking after new business which shows that eyes are now turned our way. Another great assistance to our town is the opening of the new bridge at Granville Ferry, which is sure to increase next summer's automobile trade, but the greatest attraction for bringing visitors to our town is a good hotel and this town now has the best one in its history. We refer to the Riverside Inn, formerly the St. James, which is now the property of Mr. O. C. Jones, manager of the hotel department of the Dominion Atlantic Railway system. Mr. Jones is a live wire who is spending a large amount of money in advertising the town as a vacation resort, the first class drives throughout the valley and the lakes and streams where good fishing abounds. The Riverside Inn, like the Cornwalls Inn at Kentville, and the Pines at Digby, is giving the travelling public excellent satisfaction and travellers in this vicinity make a point to reach Bridgetown for a night's rest or the week end.

Our regular industries, M. W. Graves & Co., manufacturers of vinegar and cider, and proprietors of the Graves' apple evaporator plant, have been for the past three or four months running two shifts every twenty-four hours. The Annapolis Valley Cider Co., which recently took first prize at the London, England, exhibition, have also been running full time manufacturing and bottling the famous "Evangeline" brand of apple cider and other "Evangeline" drinks. Beeler & Peters, manufacturers of barrel heading and staves, have been running one mill in town, one at South Paradise and one at Dalhousie, and will, during 1922, commence milling operations at Clementsport. J. H. Hicks & Sons are running their building supply factory to its fullest capacity as well as lumbering in Dalhousie South. The MacKenzie-Crowe Co., manufacturers of larrigans, which was shut down for a short time during the year following a general depression after the rush during the war, is again running on full time and as usual turning out a first class line of goods.

Bridgetown's newest industry is Coun. J. S. Moses' sausage and mince meat works, which, although not yet advertised, is turning out more than two tons of meat per month, which finds a ready sale throughout the valley and along the South Shore.

Our retail merchant's report, the biggest Christmas trade in their history and are all looking forward to a big 1922. Mr. M. W. Graves has presented the Canadian National Railway with sufficient land on which to construct a Y so that train service on that line will be increased from a weekly to a tri-weekly and possibly a daily service. Bridgetown is therefore favored with a good service on the Dominion Atlantic Railway and promised an improvement on the Canadian National Railway, and already has, during the greater portion of the year, when navigation is open on the Annapolis River, the steamer Valinda, owned and operated by the Bridgetown Steamship Co., Ltd., making weekly trips between this port, which is the head of navigation, and St. John's, carrying full cargoes of general freight both ways. Your correspondent firmly believes there is a bright future for Bridgetown which is, one of the best located towns in the Annapolis Valley.
