### DEATH OF COLONEL THOMAS B. THORPE.

Colonel Inomas B. Thorpe, the well-known journalist, writer and politician, died at Roosevelt Hospital, of Bright's disease, early Friday morning of last week. He had been for some hours unconscious, and died without pain. Col. Thorps was born in New York in March, 1815, received a common-school education, and removed to Louisiana on attaining his majority. Here he became noted as a writer, and published in the Spirit of the Times his famous sketch, "Tom Owen, the Bee-Hanter," which was extensively reproduced. He followed this with equally popular skotches. He was proficient in many things, a first-class chess player, an excellent painter, and a superior writer on art subjects. His published works stand high. Col. Thorpe, in later years, became an active Republican politician, and, being a remarkably good speaker, his services were freely called into requisition as a campaign orator.—Spirit.
