not a large and prosperous, business. Its  
banking facilities have been improved within  
the current year by the opening of a branch of  
the Bank of Hamilton under the management  
of Mr. R. T. Haun, formerly the popular  
agent of the Bank of Commerce in that town.Several Quebec lumber merchants who  
formerly were content to transact their Mont-  
real business through agents find that the ex-  
port trade in deals is concentrating here to  
such an extent that they find it necessary to  
start branch offices in this city.—The ship  
*Polynesian* of Quebec, bound for Montreal from  
Iliolo, Batavia, with sugar has put into the  
Mauritius leaking, and will discharge cargo  
there.Mr. A. Blackburn of Kemptville, Ont., is  
also receiving a settlement at 75 cents on the  
dollar, payable in five equal instalments, at 3,  
6, 9, 12 and 15 months, with interest at seven  
per cent, the notes to date from 1st June, the  
three last payments secured by Thomas Black-  
burn, and a transfer of all the real estate  
owned by Andrew Blackburn to be made to  
Mr. Geo. Lightbound in trust for creditors un-  
til all payments are met.R. M. FITZSIMMONS, grocer, etc., Brockville,  
Ont., has assigned to W. A. Reid. He was for  
some years of the firm of R. M. Fitzsimmons &  
Bro. in that town. In 1882 he removed to  
Montreal and opened up a wholesale groceryand liquor business as R. M. Fitzsimmons &  
Co., but this venture not proving equal to  
expectations, he returned to Brockville nearly  
a year ago. The brother continued the busi-  
ness and R. M. opened a new store with the  
result noted.NORMAN H. PHINNEY, general storekeeper,  
in pumps, etc., Lawrencetown, N.S., recently  
made an assignment, showing liabilities of  
about \$6,000 and assets of about \$2,800. He  
offers secured creditors 25 cents in the dollar,  
payable in 3, 6 and 9 months, secured.—Alex.  
McKay, a steady attentive druggist of Dor-  
chester, N.B., who has latterly been troubled  
with executions amounting to less than \$1,000.  
has assigned his book-debts, etc., to J. E.  
Church in trust.A BANK clerk named A. Bernard (son of the  
late Dr. Bernard, ex-mayor of Montreal) em-  
ployed in a leading monetary institution in  
this city is missing, and a shortage has been  
detected in his accounts of nearly \$1,000. He  
is believed to have gone to Boston, and the  
Guarantee Company of North America, which  
is interested, will probably effect his arrest.  
With its extensive agencies throughout the con-  
tinent the Guarantee Company is in a position  
to deal summarily with such cases.The Allan SS. Corean, which arrived at  
Quebec from London recently brought 1,800  
boxes containing 1,000,000 rounds of ball cart-
