He had recently returned from the east and during the course of our conversation it was indicated that autumn would be the most comfortable time to visit those capitals. That is as far as it went. I am sorry that I have no plans at the present time for accepting that invitation at any early date.

Mr. George A. Drew (Leader of the Opposition): Mr. Speaker, I feel sure that should the possibility of such a trip present itself the members of this house and the Canadian people would be most happy that the Prime Minister of Canada was able in that way to express the good will of Canada to the sister nations of the commonwealth whose close association with us is so important at this time.

PEACE RIVER COUNTRY-REQUEST FOR FACILITIES FOR REMOVAL OF WHEAT IN STORAGE

There is in the Peace river country 10,500,000 bushels of wheat still in storage: 8,500,000 bushels in the elevators and 2 million bushels still in storage on the farm. They have only shipped 23,500,000 bushels from the Peace river country this year, which means that in the next two months, if they are to be ready for the next crop, over 5,000 carloads will have to be shipped out of that country if the farmers are to have any storage space available. Will the parliamentary assistant draw this matter to the attention of the wheat board and the transport controller to see if cars cannot be provided for that area?

Mr. G. J. McIlraith (Parliamentary Assistant to the Minister of Trade and Commerce): Mr. Speaker, I shall be glad to have the whole situation looked into and if anything should be done I will see that the necessary action is taken.
