Unexpected allies of the Catholics in their fight for justice to their schools are appearing on all sides. The Recorder at Rochester in his charge to the Grand Jury at the Quarter Sessions drow their special attention and that of the public, to the very neavy calendar bofore them and the great proportion of offences committed by boys. During the past six months sixty two boys under the age of sixteen had been charged fo-fore the magistrates of this district. Twenty-four of these cases were for felony, fitteen for wilful damage and one for drunken and disorderly con duct. An even more direct indict-ment against Golless education is furnished in the report of a coroner's inquest at Southamption. A boy named Thos, Farnstone, aged 10 years, whose father had died some-what euddenly was brought up for examination, when the following con-versation took place: Coroner: Now my lad, do you know that you ought to geak the truth ?
