but to offer those gentlemen every information, either perfonally, or otherwise, which my experience and situations may have furnished me with upon the subject.

Different opinions have gone forth refpecting the two modes of fupplying the trains wanted for the land and water movements, and various other exigencies of an acting army; and I understand, that each is fupported by the fuffrages of most respectable military characters.

As the determining this great national queftion may involve most important future confequences to the public, every aid should be fought which can throw light upon the fubject; and I am of opinion, that the fentiments of all the general officers who have had commands from Lord Amherst, who, I be-
