FIFTY MILLION DOLLARS TO BUY CANADA FOR U.S.

Government to Guarantee C.N.R. Bonds.

OTTAWA, May 8.—The minister of railways has given notice of the intention of the government to guarantee the bonds of the Canadian Northern Railway over the completed and uncompleted portions of the company's line between Montreal and Port Arthur.

It is made conditional to the guarantee that the company shall carry traffic destined to a Canadian port over its own line; that the thru rate on export traffic from the point of origin to the point of destination shall at no time be greater to a Canadian port than to a United States port; that all such traffic shall be carried to Canadian ocean ports, and that the company shall not advise or encourage transportation to foreign ports.
