

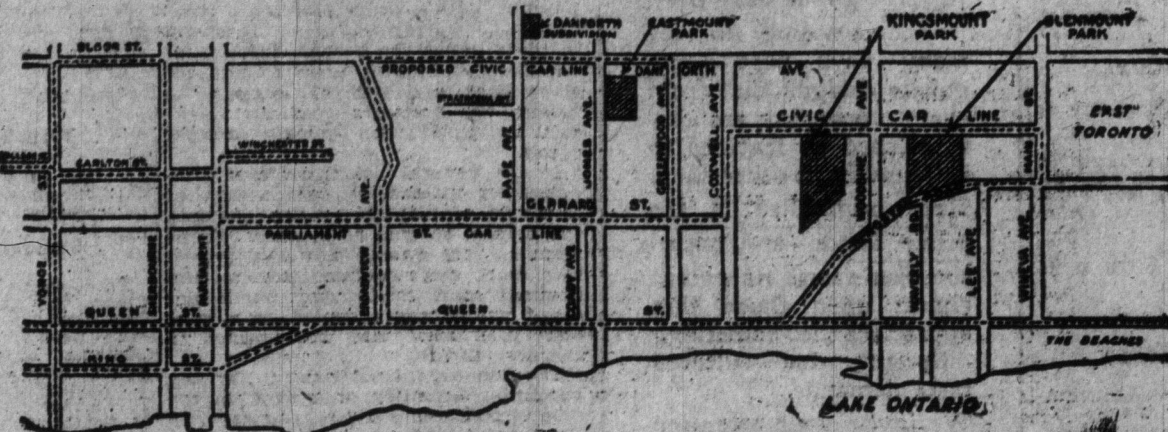

### N. TORONTO FOR GOOD ROADS PLAN

Council Endorsed Permanent  
Pavements on Saturday—  
Deadlock Over School  
Sites—County News.

NORTH TORONTO, April 22.—(Special.)—Saturday's session of the North Toronto Town Council was an important one, notwithstanding the fact that the Metropolitan Railway did not, as expected, bring down a formal offer for the double-tracking of Yonge-street. There was little discussion of the matter, at least in public. With the exception of Councillor Baker, who is absent in Europe on a business trip, all the members were present, Mayor Brown presiding.

One of the most important schemes ever put thru was that of Saturday's meeting in the adoption of the resolution introduced by Councillor Ball at the last session, in which seven streets were named on which permanent pavements on the initiative would be at once put down. The streets already named are: Eglinton East, Broadway, Blythwood, Bowdoin, Glencairn, Roselawn, Merton.

The scheme briefly is to put down permanent pavements of a type to be approved by the engineer, to do this on the initiative, charging up to the general rate one-third of the cost with the highways and intersections, and to make these streets effective in relieving the present awful conditions and to make these streets effective in relieving the present awful conditions and to make these streets effective in relieving the present awful conditions.

While Councillor Reid was known to be opposed, it was thought, with this exception, the scheme would pass unanimously. But Councillor Muston stood against the improvement, and the result was that the mayor and Councillors Lawrence, Howe and Ball voted for it, and Councillors Muston and Reid against. The total mileage proposed is between 10 and 12, the engineer says that from three to four will be the limit for this year. Throughout the general satisfaction was expressed at the fact that council had determined on a progressive plan.

There was a deadlock over the question of a site for the Davisville School, which Chairman Palmer moved upon the board, accompanied by Mr. Lorgie and one or two others were present to advise the purchase of another site somewhere near Glenwood-avenue and the Mount Pleasant school. A number of people representing about 70 rate-payers opposed the application of the school board and stated that if given time they could secure practically every man in the Davisville district to oppose the purchase of another site. The latter were, however, overborne, and refused to consider the board's attitude, as did when asked to do so by council.

Councillor Howe put up a big fight against the board's attitude, as did Councillor Lawrence and the mayor.
