WILSON EXTENDS THE REGULATIONS

Thousands of Small Bakeries Now Included in Licensing Sysem.

PURCHASES LIMITED

Wheat Flour Can Be Bought Only on Percentage of Requirements.

Washington, Jan. 31.—Licensing regulations, as applied to bakers, were extended by President Wilson in a proclaation tonight, to take in hotels, restaurants and clubs which do their own bak-ing, to include thousands of small bakers neretofore exempt, and to cover the manufacture of bread of every kind, inng cake, crackers, biscuits, pastry

and other bakery products.

At the same time the president put under license all importers and distributors of green coffee, to prevent speculative prices in the coffee market.

All licenses must be obtained by Feb. 4, when the new regulations become effective

Purchases Limited.

Bakers of bread and rolls will be limited in their wheat flour purchases to 80 per cent. of their requirements, up to July 31, and bakers of other products, including crackers, biscuits, cookies, cakes, pies, fruit cakes, pastry and sweet yeast doughs, to 70 per cent. for the same partied.
