Order-in-Council Sets Time Limit

Soldiers Must Apply Before February to Have Retraining Course.

Ottawa, Nov. 4.—Ex-members of the Canadian forces who desire to take advantage of the vocational retraining courses conducted by the department of soldiers' civil re-establishment, and who have not yet made application, must do so before February 1 next.

Men Transferred

Where an ex-member of the forces has been transferred from the department of militia and defence or the department of naval service to the department of soldiers' civil re-establishment for a continuation of treatment, such ex-member of the forces shall be allowed three months from the date of retirement or discharge or from the conclusion of such treatment to make application for the benefits of retraining.

G.W.V.A. Branch in Peterboro Call for a Dominion Election

Peterboro, Nov. 4.—The Peterboro branch of the Great War Veterans' Association, which was organized at a meeting in the G.W.V.A. hall last night, unanimously passed a vote of confidence in the Dominion command of the G.W.V.A. in regard to its handling of the re-establishment and gratuity question.

Final arrangements for the armistice banquet and reunion on Nov. 11 were announced at the third meeting of the Blue and White club, held in the Central Y.M.C.A. on Monday night.

Against Roebuck Attorney-General

District and County Commissions, G. W. V. A., Question His War Record.

Returned soldiers are not all of one opinion in regard to the proposed election of Arthur Roebuck as attorney-general for the province of Ontario. At a meeting of the joint executive of the Toronto district and county commands of the G. W. V. A., held at the headquarters of the Parkdale branch last night, the following resolution was passed: "Be it resolved that this meeting go on record as not in favor of a slacker or an anti-conscriptivist candidate like Arthur Roebuck as attorney-general for the province of Ontario."

Judgment: There is nothing in the nature of a penalty about this article 9 of the lease. It is a contract pure and simple, and the cases cited do not apply. There will be judgment for his majesty for the full amount claimed, with costs of the high court to be settled by the plaintiff's lawyer.

First Divisional Court. Mather v. Bank of Ottawa—Appeal continued from yesterday, with same counsel, and concluded. Judgment reserved. Foster v. Oakes—L. F. Hellmuth, K.C., and S. J. Birnbaum, for plaintiff, appealed from Kelly, J.; R. McKay, K.C., and J. Y. Murdoch, for defendant. Action by plaintiff for declaration that C. A. Foster is entitled to two blocks of stock, 25,000 and 15,000 shares in Tough Oakes Gold Mines Company. Counterclaim by defendant for return of certain shares, and an accounting. At trial plaintiff's action was dismissed, and judgment was given in favor of defendant on the counterclaim. Appeal argued, but not concluded.
