## **GOT SOME LOCAL COLOR**

Aldermen in Quest of Enlightenment on Problem of Esplanade, Cover the Ground.

The civic "Greater Toronto" committee spent a profitable afternoon yesterday in inspection of the grade Gyrsy Dance .. La Tzigane Dansante railway crossings along the Esplanade, beginning with the Don Queenstreet crossing and ending at Sunnyside. Engineer C. B. Smith accompanied the aldermen, and, while a majority of those present were inclined to favor the viaduct, the explanation of Mr. Smith's reasons for advocating the plan of bridges was listened to

closest attention. The party proceeded first in carriages to the East Queen-street crossing. Engineer Smith said the tracks would have to remain as they were, and that a bridge should be built across the Don for vehicular and street car traffic. The bridge would go up the incline on the west side, and its eastern terminus would be 450 and its eastern terminus would be 450 feet to the east of the east bank of the Don. Mr. Smith thought the Grand

would be raised 8 or 9 feet.

The crossing at the foot of Cherrystreet was next viewed. At this point there are 13 lines of G.T.R. track. If a viaduct were begun there, the Grand Trunk yards would probably have to terminate just east of the present crossing, he claimed. On the Parliament-street crossing
