

VANDERBILTS REACHING OUT AFTER CONNECTIONS IN CANADA

Indications That the New York Central Will Acquire the Ottawa
and New York Line and Thus Get Into the Canadian
Capital—A Visit of Directors.

Ottawa, April 11.—The rumor of the entrance to Ottawa of the Vanderbilt system of railways, by the acquisition of the Ottawa and New York Railway line, has been strengthened within the past two days. Mr. S. R. Callaway, president of the New York Central Railway; Dr. Sewell B. Eldred, president of the Erie, and Webb, chairman of the Erie and the Rutland, were in the city yesterday, having come over the Ottawa and New York line on a tour of inspection. They traveled in a special train. The railway magnates expressed themselves as favorably impressed with the line, and their minute inspection is construed as an indi-

Minister of Public Works and Minister of Railways Make Deadlock in Cabinet Seances—Plains of Abraham Sale

Gets All Quebec Astrir.

Ottawa, April 11.—(Special.)—The discussions in the Cabinet, especially between Tarte and Blair over the Crown's Nest Pass Railway bill, were plainly evident at the meeting of the Railway Committee this morning. Last night it was supposed that the bill would go down without opposition, having been announced that the C.P.R. and the Co-Ex-Jax interests had reached an agreement.

The expectations were rudely shocked this morning, when Mr. Tarte led an onslaught on the bill advocating that it be held over unless the company would make a definite agreement with the committee that the Canadian consumer of coal and coke would not be discriminated against.
