HOW MAKAROFF WENT DOWN.

St. Petersburg, April 13, 6.38 p.m.—The following official despatch has been received here from Rear Admiral Grigorovitch, the commandant at Port Arthur, addressed to the emperor:

Port Arthur, April 13.—The Petropaviovsk struck a mine, which blew her up, and she turned turtle. Our squadron was under Golden Hill. The Japanese squadron was approaching. Vice-Admiral Makaroff evidently was lost. Grand Duke Cyril was saved. He is slightly injured. Capt. Jakovlef was saved, tho severely injured, as were five officers and thirty-two men, all more or less insjured. The enemy's fleet has disappeared. Rear Admiral Prince Ouktomsky has assumed command of the fleet."
