SECURITIES ARE STEADY

AT TORONTO AND NEW YORK

Gold Shipments Continued, But Prices Are Not Affected—Tractions Firm Locally.

World Office, Wednesday Evening, May 4.

There was a generally firm tone to local securities today, but activity was concentrated in one or two issues. The stock market was advanced to within a fraction of last week's high point. The cable earnings for April gave an increase of \$500 for the month, and this was given as the reason for the issue. Twin City developed more activity today, and the price was raised fractionally. Toronto Electric exhibited a little more firmness, but the enquiry for this stock seems very limited. The market for foreign securities was not sufficient to change values materially in any direction. The statement of Dominion Coal for the year showed a fall of 18,328 tons compared with last year, but no stock was taken at firm quotations. Dominion Steel bonds were bid up at the close without affecting the market.

At Boston today Dominion Coal closed bid 6 1/2, asked 6 3/4, and Dominion Steel bid 10 1/2, asked 10 3/4.

At New York MacKay common closed 23 1/2, 23 1/4, and preferred 67 1/2, 68.
