London.

Fatal Floods in Germany—Famine and Fever in Russia - Italy's Cabinet Crisis Passed-An Awful Murder-100 Houses Burned.

London, May 12.—The foreign office announces that the negotiations for the amicable settlement of the ex-States and Canada have not been RREVEREN broken off, and that there is no reaisting differences between the United son, to judge from present conditions, that these negotiations will be brought to an unfruitful conclusion.

Sir Charles Dilke said that America seems anxious to come to terms and so that he could see no reason why the two countries being thus minded could

not agree. Sir Howard Vincent, Sir Wm. Houldsworth, and Mr. Jas. Lowther held the opinion that Canada would benefit by self-reliance, and contended that the United States had decided to bring the negotiations to a close the action should throw Canadian trade into British hands exclusively, and that therefore England should support the Dominion to keep for Europe what the United States will soon be eager to obtain at any price-the timber of Canada."

DISTRESS IN RUSSIA.

The condition of the famine sufferers in the eastern provinces of Russia is appalling. Typhus and scurvy are now rampant among the starved inhabitants, who are dying by scores. The inhabitants of the Samara district are reported to be eating grass.

#### FATAL FLOODS.

Incessant rains have prevailed since April 30, producing disastrous floods, especially in the eastern Oder district. At Oderou, in Austrian Silesia, an immense district has been inundated. At Dresden the River Elbe is higher than it has been at any previous period for twenty years. The tributaries of the Elbe and Oder have overflowed, inundating the Roesa district. At Bieterfield eleven persons were drowned in attempting to cross the River Nulne. The rains still continue.

INSURRECTION.

The insurrection in Yemen is gaining ground. The Turkish commander, Abdullah Pasha, has been forced to re-treat on Sana, the capital of the province of Yemen, after having sustained great losses of men from Arab night attacks, desertion and famine. force has been utterly demoralized. 200 BUILDINGS BURNED.

Vienna, May 12.—In a great fire yes-terdan in the town of Gura Humora, Province of Bukowina, 200 buildings, including the principal church, the town hall, and all the schools were destroyed.

KILLED HIS FIVE CHILDREN. Odessa, May 11.—An insane customs official murdered his five sleeping children here last night, and then at-tacked his wife, who is dying of her wounds.

#### A PARIS SCANDAL. A Paris dispatch says the latest

Canada equally anxious to conciliate, Self-Styled Religionist Appeals From the Magistrate to God.

> A Disreputable Publication Compared to the Bible.

New York's Board of Health Will Look After Alleged "Faith Healers."

Windsor, May 12.-The trial of "Right Rev." D. L. Mackay, on a charge of publishing a lewd, scandalous and obscene paper calculated to contaminate the subjects of her Majesty," was called in the police court, and the "Right Rev." appeared, wearing his long hair streaming down his back, and surmounted by a Scotch bonnet with a red top. Under his left arm he carried a polyglot Bible, which, he announced, was his sword and shield, and on which

he would base his defense. "Mollie Dalton is here," he said defiantly, "and is prepared to swear that the charges she made against Detroit men are true. Prosecutor Frazer would do nothing for us in Detroit, and we had to bring the matter before the public in some way."

He elected to be tried by the magistrate, and pleaded not guilty.

CHANGED THE CHARGE. The authorities found it impossible to connect Mackay with the publication of the New Eve Success, the organ of healers."

President Murphy suggests that the medical societies be asked for advice in this endeavor to stamp out "faith healers." the Flying Rollers, so they changed the charge against him to one of selling a lewd, wicked and scandalous paper. Mackay acted as his own counsel, assisted by two others of the long-haired brethren, who were busy taking notes throughout the trial.

Chief of Police Willis testified to seizing a number of copies of the paper in Mackay's store, and in his opinion the paper was obscene and scandalous. Several witnesses testified to buying copies of the paper. The last of these was Jake Guittard, and he was the first whom Mackay crossexamined.

"Have you read the Bible?" he ask?

Mackay read a passage from Samuel day inducted at Brantford to succeed and then asked the witness: "Don't the late Dr. Cochrane. you think that is worse than anything that appeared in our paper?" MUSTN'T TRAVESTY THE BIBLE.

"Stop!" shouted the magistrate. "I won't allow you to insult the Bible and make a travesty of it. The people of those days had not the same idea of morality that we have in this Christian era, so you can let that alone. I must rule out all such references. You can appeal to decisions given in similar cases.

#### APPEALS TO GOD. Mackay-I appeal to God! "You may do that," said the magis-

trate, "but I object to you as his interpreter." "Hear, hear," shouted Rev. James Livingstone, the Methodist minister, who was an interested spectator, "that's right."

"I would ask you to note," said Mackay to the magistrate, "that the Bible is ruled out." "I will do nothing of the kind," retorted the magistrate promptly.

INSPIRED BY THE DEVIL. Rev. James Livingstone thought the articles were a sad commentary on the teachings of Israel. He would not say that they were intentionally ob-

scene, but they were ignorantly and superstitiously obscene. He believed they were inspired by the devil. 'Are you not aware," asked Mackay, "that Israel is fulfilling her mission by exposing the abominations of the Gentiles?

"Can you trace your succession?" asked the minister in turn.

A SON OF DAVID. "I am the son of my father David." said Mackay, and a theological discussion ensued. It was finally stopped by the magistrate, who regretted that the defendant had not a legal adviser.

"They are all against me," Mackay, "even if I pay them \$100 a day. Too much learning has made them mad." Then they came back to the articles

"If you wanted to keep your mouth clean you would not publish any such articles," said the magistrate. Finally Mackay kissed the book, and then rubbed his lips at intervals for the next few minutes. He said he was a preacher of righteousness and an exposer of abominations. His object was to defend public morals and for the public good. Then Crown Attorney Clark took him in hand, but Mackay swore that he had not seen the articles before they were published; he did not know where the paper was published or who was the publisher. "Oho!" said the magistrate, signifi-

cantly.
"The New Eve Company gets the proceeds," Mackay went on. "It has no executive officer, and no head that I know of. The papers are brought to my store. They come from the printing house. Our printing house is at 47 Hamlin avenue.

"Then these papers are printed in Detroit?" asked the attorney.

#### A KNOW-NOTHING.
