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COLLEGIATE LADS WILL BE TAUGHT LATEST ATTACKS

Hint Given That Compulsory Training Has Been Applied For.

TO DRILL IN PLATOONS

Capt. Syme Already Has Organization of London Corps Under Way.

Although the high school cadet corps is not yet organized a fine response to the call for new members of the corps is expected in soon as the necessary equipment for its establishment is forthcoming.

Capt. J. J. Syme, officer in charge, is enthusiastic that this year's corps will surpass in efficiency and numbers any corps of previous years.

Within two weeks it is expected that officers will be selected and a system of training inaugurated which will be practically the same as that carried out by the active militia. Instead of the old half-company mode of drilling which was carried on last year, the modern platoon system will be begun, so that the collegiate cadets may be conversant with the most up-to-date methods of military training.

May Be Compulsory. It is expected that approximately one hundred and fifty boys will volunteer for cadet training unless permission to make it compulsory to join the corps is obtained from the master of cadets for the district. An effort will be made to have drill for all boys at the collegiate put into force this year. It is understood. The physical benefits will be urged upon the authorities. In case authorization to compel the boys to join will be given, a great many of last year's officers have either graduated from the corps or will be interested to work on farms for the fall, consequently a new staff of officers will be organized.

A syllabus of instruction has been conceived by Captain Syme that will give the members of the corps every chance to experience the rigors of military life. The Swedish method of military drill, which has been introduced into the syllabus. Other physical training will take place inside the gymnasium.

Teach Attack Methods. Captain Syme expects to be able to teach the cadets the method of a company attacking before the end of the year. This will be a stage hitherto unattained by them and will provide some particularly interesting work.

Extended drill and platoon drill will demand the better part of the time devoted to work during the spring and summer months. The corps will be taught throughout September and October.

HERE'S WHAT GROCERY EXPERT HAS TO SAY OF FOODSTUFFS FOR PRICES OF FOODSTUFFS

The following comment on the market situation as regards foodstuffs will appear in Canadian Grocer this week: Of primary interest to the grocery trade during the week was the announcement of prices for the 1917 season. There was no disappointment. Owing to the disappointing small pack there will be only a percentage delivery by the packers. In the case of one-pound sockeye tins there will be only 9 per cent of orders delivered, while in sockeye half-pound tins there will be only 40 per cent delivered. On coho salmon there will be 10 per cent of orders delivered. On pink salmon there will be the best delivery of any of the brands, namely, 50 per cent on one-pound and 100 per cent on half-pounds.

Bacon To Be Bought Like Cheese. Rumors of an embargo on the export of bacon from Canada are not taken seriously by those connected with the provision trade. It is pointed out that Great Britain needs the bacon and that in all probability some central buying agency will be established similar to that in operation for the purchase of Canadian cheese. Egg production has

been heavier during the past week, but has not been sufficient to make the price recede. Butter prices remained unchanged. Pasture is now in excellent shape and production of creamery butter and cheese should be greatly facilitated throughout Ontario.

Many Slight Advances. Advances have been recorded on jam, baking powder, lobsters, tapioca and sago, herbs, sulphur, tobacco, tomato soups. A decline was recorded on porridge wheat, which comes as a welcome change in the steady upward trend of the market.

Manitoba flour was another commodity in which a decline was registered, a clean drop of 81 per barrel taking place. This was induced by reason of a 20-cent decline in wheat. Apparently, through inspired sources, the idea has gained currency that the price to be established for Manitoba wheat is to be \$2.20 per bushel. And prices in the market forthwith dropped to that level before the official announcement has been made. Sugar is in weak market, due to the establishment of a lower price in the United States for beet sugar. Declines are also noted in the Canadian market. Business with the grocery trade is reported very good.

NO MORE GAY SOCKS OR SOFT CAPS MAY BE WORN BY OFFICERS, ORDER SAYS

CIRCULATION AT PUBLIC LIBRARY GROWS STEADILY

Much Reading Was Done During Summer Months.

NEW MEMBER WELCOMED

Rev. Dr. McCrae Took His Place at Last Night's Meeting.

A circulation of books at the public library during the three summer months has been doing an increase over the same period last year of 12,500 volumes, was reported by the librarian at the meeting of the library board last night. At the east end branch the circulation of books totaled 11,447, an increase over last year of 50 per cent.

This has been partly due to the much improved accommodation at the branch since the enlargement in the spring. New Member Welcomed.

Rev. Dr. McCrae, appointed to succeed Rev. Dr. Flinders, took his place at the board meeting, and was welcomed by the chairman who named him to the library committee. Miss Hazel Tanner and Miss Elsie Mulder were named for vacant positions on the staff, the appointment to be made after they attended the examinations of the provincial library training school. Miss Marjorie Flinders, who has been head of the children's department for two years, leaves at the end of this month for Winnipeg to take up her duties with the Manitoba Government. In receiving her resignation the members of the board expressed their appreciation of the excellent service she has given in the library.

New List Issued. The library has just issued a new and revised list of books for the summer which will be given distribution at once. The list includes the books in the department of advertising, bookkeeping, banking, insurance, scientific management, and other subjects.

There have also been issued this year a list of the books on music and a list of the books on law for lawyers and others.

It has been decided by the board that from now on, there will be special assistance given to those who come to the library and who desire aid in choosing books needed. This has been done to some extent in the past and has been much appreciated, especially by the department records show that during the last three months there has been an increase of 40 per cent in the number of books loaned for information and of 30 per cent in the number of those given personal assistance by the reference librarians.

The recently organized headquarters band will make its first public appearance, and will play music to the party arriving and the Londoners in the station to the hospital. Automobiles have been secured, and in spite of the fact that nearly sixty men will arrive, there will be accommodation for all, a member of the reception committee told The Advertiser today.

Nearly half a unit of the men returning are "duty men," and will not go to the Military Hospital, but will march to Wolsey Barracks, where they will be given direct to the hospital. There they will be "boarded" immediately, and those from other Western Ontario towns given leave and an opportunity to reach their homes by the next train.
