ONLY TWO SERIOUS CASES COMMUNICABLE DISEASE REPORTED DURING WEEK

Diphtheria Adds to Its List Here—Chickenpox Leads.

Twenty-seven cases of communicable disease made their appearance in London during the week ending June 15, according to the report of the London Institute of Public Health. Chickenpox led the way with seven, followed by measles with six, and diphtheria with five. There were also four cases of scarlet fever and tuberculosis, shared second place, with four cases each. Cases of diphtheria were reported from the residential districts of their one victim each. Smallpox, typhoid, measles and mumps are mentioned as the most dreaded diseases, drew blanks.

QUERIES REGARDING MILITARY SERVICE

Send in Your Problems and They Will Be Answered From Official Information by The Advertiser.

C. B. Q.—Would a young man, 20 years of age, who enlisted in the Royal Air Force, and was transferred to the Army Reserve, Class B, until called upon, have to register under the national registration law?
A.—It would be advisable to register. The regulations state that those on active service are not required to register. As it may be some time before you are actually called upon to serve, it would be wise for you to register. Go to the nearest postmaster.

M. J. W. Q.—I was granted exemption last fall as long as I remained farming, but did not get a certificate of exemption. I am not in the present draft called. Could I get a certificate of exemption and to whom would I write for it?
A.—Yes, you can obtain it. Write the deputy registrar, Royal Bank Building, London, Ont.

CREDITORS Q.—Could my brother, a B2 man, get a transfer from Calgary, London? He is on the paymaster's staff.
A.—What is the name of the officer in charge of No. 1 Company of the 1st Depot Battalion, London.

A. What is the number of the military district?
A.—When transferred, does a soldier have to pay his own transportation charges?
A.—He can take it with his O. A. It is possible that his request might be granted by Ottawa.

The companies are distinguished by letters, not numbers, in that unit. Address to the O. C. of the company. You do not need a transfer.

ARNER Q.—Will a man 22 years old have to comply with national registration law after having reported at London and put in his O. C. and a transfer to a military district?
A.—Only men on active service are exempted from national registration. If they are likely to be on leave for some time, it would be advisable for you to register. Go to the nearest postmaster.

S. G. Q.—My son, 20 years of age, entered the Canadian navy before June 1, and is now in training, but did not register before being transferred from the military draft into the navy?
A.—

R. E. A. Q.—Why is it that men that were raised from lower categories and placed in A, are getting notices to report, instead of getting a tribunal hearing to present their claims, as was told them by the registrars?

As they are men who had not attained the age of 23 years when they were drafted, they have no chance to claim exemption. Hence it will be their time to take them before a tribunal. Exemptions for men of that age have been granted by a tribunal. If they are over that age, they have a right to present any claims for exemption they may have before a tribunal. If ordered to report, it may be due to a mistake. In that case they should call the attention of the registrar of their district to the error. In any case, let them not fail to report on the day of their report, even though they do so under protest.
