Evasive and Unsatisfactory Reply From Bucharest Displeases All.

MUST LEAVE HUNGARY

Sir George Clerk Reports the Hungarian Political Situation Much Improved.

Parls. Nov. 13.-The supreme council to escape the crowd. today discussed the note to be sent to Rumania in response to Rumania's recent note. The allied reply, it is forecasted, will be very firm in tone, the Rumanian note being regarded as evasive and unsatisfactory-notably so as concerned the demand for evacuation of Hungary by the Rumanians. The allied note was not completed today, but it will be put into shape very shortly, and forwarded to Rucharest within two days.

The report received from Sir George llerk, the allfed commissioner to Buda-Clerk, the allied commissioner to Budapest, was considered as showing that political conditions in Hungary were much improved, and that there were indications of a coalition government being organized shortly in Budapest with which the conference would deal.
