The emergency hospital, however, was quarantined as a precautionary measure.

Will Meet Delegation of Western University Today.

TORONTO, March 9.—Dr. George E. Vincent and Dr. R. M. Pearce, representatives of the Rockefeller Foundation, arrived in this city today in connection with the Rockefeller grant of \$5,000,000 for medical research in Canada. They conferred with the medical faculty of the University of Toronto, and visited some of the hospitals here. Dr. Vincent, who is chairman of the Rockefeller Foundation, said that no decision as to the allocation of the money would be reached at the present time.

Dr. Pearce will come to Toronto again and hold conferences with the university medical school, the university authorities, provincial officials and other citizens interested in the development of medicine and public health in Ontario.

Dr. Vincent will remain in Toronto for several days, and tomorrow will receive delegations from Queen's University and Western University.

LIQUOR IS STOLEN.—Calgary, Alta., March 10.—Over \$1,000 worth of liquor was stolen from a local drug store by burglars early yesterday. The police have no trace of the thieves.

RAILWAY STATION BURNED.—Bridgewater, N.S., March 10.—The Halifax and Southwestern railway station, which was destroyed by fire last night. The loss is \$10,000.

LANSBURY IS QUARANTINED.—Halsbury, March 10.—George Lansbury, editor of the London Daily Herald, labor organ, who recently went to Russia as the Finnish envoy, has returned from the Soviet Union. He is now being held in the quarantine camp at Terijoki, but the regulation requiring a fortnight's stay there.

KNITTING MILLS BURNED.—Charlottetown, P. E. I., March 10.—The Beaman Knitting Mills, at Tyngs, were destroyed with all their contents, including machinery, yarn and finished garments by fire which broke out yesterday morning. The damage is between \$10,000 and \$50,000 with about \$25,000 insurance. The origin of the fire is unknown.

TEACHERS ASK ADVANCES.—St. Catharines, March 10.—The teachers of this city have advanced from 25 to 50 and 75 cents was cited by one of several public school teachers, who waited on the trustee board last night in a demand for salary increases. The board held out little hope, as the estimates had been prepared but promised the usual consideration.

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
