BREAD BILL HAS PASSED COMMITTEE'S BUSY DAY

Municipal, Legal and Private Bills Legislators Consider Several Important Items.

The municipal committee of the legislature yesterday passed, to come into effect July 1, the McNaught bread bill, the chief features of which are that all except fancy bread must be in 1-2 or 3-lb. loaves with the label optional; fancy breads to be 16 or 20 ounces and labeled with maker's name, weight and guarantee of standard. Bread-makers shall have scales and weights for weights. No flour, bran or deleterious material shall be used. Any municipal council may appoint inspectors to test bread in the bakeries. Any loaf which under weight shall be subject to seizure, but the maker shall not be liable to any other penalty under the act unless any ten loaves, when weighed together, shall fall below the legal standard.

A provincial analysis of bread ingredients shall be accepted as evidence. A bread of the act will call for a fine of not more than \$5 or 20 days' imprisonment.

The Sutherland auto bill was also reported, demanding licenses for all professional chauffeurs who must be given if years of age, and a name, and a distinctive mark on the vehicle if a horse appears frightened; stoppage when meeting a funeral (outside city limits).

T. H. Preston said the special committee also recommended that the fees of 25 horse-power machines be \$5, and machines over 25 to \$10. He also suggested that a distinctive mark be furnished for American motors. These are matters for departmental regulation.

The committee killed T. H. Preston's bill to allow natural gas companies to pipe lines thru municipalities, subject to the approval of the Railway and Municipal Board, the committee believing that municipalities should have control of their streets.

The legal committee "talked out" a bill to amend the charter of the Ontario Chartered Accountants Association by which accountants, unless members of the provincial association, could be prohibited from using the designation of "chartered accountant," or the initials "F.C.A.," "A.C.A.," or "C.A.," either alone or in combination with any other words or initials, and a description implying that he is a chartered accountant, or any similar title, initials, or description implying competency as an accountant.

J. Craig of Wellington, introduced a bill allowing a judge to correct his own mistakes in preparing voters' lists. Attorney-General Foy suggested leaving it for the government to act on, and Mr. Craig gave up the idea of fining judges \$5 for each mistake so made.

The private bills committee took up Ottawa's bill and authorized the increase of controllers' salaries to \$1000, instead of the \$7000 asked, while a clause permitting unlimited expenditure on the library was struck out.

Sault Ste. Marie was refused permission to buy back certain lands sold for taxes.

After half an hour's wait without a Liberal member appearing the public accounts committee was declared to have ended its labors.

ST. CATHARINES, April 7.—At St. David's, a village nine miles from here, a sensational bank robbery occurred early this morning, when four desperadoes broke into the vaults of the Imperial Bank. The explosion failed to open the inner door and \$3000 cash inside was saved.

The first explosion blew off the vault door and the robbers held off the populace with revolvers while they worked at the vault.

It appears that a number of strange men arrived in St. David's last evening, apparently intending to spend the night there. They were seen walking about the streets until midnight. Around that time they went to Doyle's residence and stole a couple of horses, which they hitched to two buggies and then drove over to the blacksmith shop. Here they procured tools with which they pried open the front door of the Imperial Bank, seemingly not caring whether they were seen or not. On gaining access to the place two of the robbers remained on guard with revolvers, while the other two blew open the vault.

Explosion Awakens People.

The first explosion blew off the big iron door. The noise of the explosion was heard by Charles Hamilton, one of the bank clerks, who lives at Doyle's and he ran up the street to see what was happening. Unfortunately he had left his revolver in the bank, but with a pluck seldom displayed by a young man, when he saw the state of affairs, made his way to the rear of the bank where he opened fire at the robbers on the guard with stones and bricks. The robbers returned the fire with their guns and sent shot after shot at the dauntless bank clerk, who, as he shed his missiles, yelled lustily for help.

Presently the residents began to emerge from their houses, awakened by the firing.

They had come for the money and intended to get it, even if they had to stand the whole town off. The appearance of the robbers in the doorway of the bank was sufficient to make the boldest among the villagers wary and they kept pretty well under cover, while the two robbers inside the

Board of Works Passed on \$10,000 Outlay—General News of a Hustling City.

HAMILTON, April 7.—(Special.)—The board of works this evening passed work that will give considerable employment to the unemployed. The repairs that will cost about \$10,000 were passed. City Engineer Barrow recommended that the whole cost of repairing the asphalt pavement adjoining the street railway tracks should be charged to the company, as it was impossible to keep the pavement next the tracks in good shape on account of their condition.
