

Rugby Soldiers Qualify For Cup Final

SOLDIER TEAM IS READY FOR FINAL

C. O. T. C. Defeat University College in Mulock Cup Semi-Final.

The Canadian Officers' Training Corps earned the right to play in the Mulock Cup final when they defeated University College 9 to 7 at Varsity stadium yesterday.

It was good football under adverse conditions. The ground was soft and footing slippery. There was not much to choose between the teams. The half time score stood 7 to 6 for the soldiers. In the first quarter, series of end runs and line punks, which netted big gains for Arts, ended in Flynn being sent over for a touchdown a few minutes after play had started. The try was not converted. O. T. C. forced the play after this, and on an attempted goal from the field, which failed, a fumble followed. Shobottom recovered the ball for a touchdown, which was not converted. Play for the remainder of the period was in a deadlock.

University carried the play into O. T. C. territory by a series of tucks, end runs, and backfield plays which caught O. T. C. napping at the start of the second quarter. At the 25-yard line, University lost by a fumble, and the soldiers forced the play. A blocked kick gave Arts possession on O. T. C.'s 35-yard line. They lost again, however, for interference, only to recover on a fumble a few downs later, getting the ball on O. T. C.'s 15-yard line. Shobottom kicked to Reid, who was forced to snipe. Taylor, for the soldiers, then broke thru for a 30-yard run, and O. T. C. pushed ten more on an offense, bringing the play to Arts' 25 line. They kicked, and McElbourn was shoved back over his own line for a safety touch, making the score 7 to 6 in favor of O. T. C. Half-time was called a minute later.

In the third quarter, Arts forced the play and gained yards twice in succession. University, however, recovered back the ground lost. Reid fumbled on his own 20-yard line, but a few minutes later broke thru for 15 yards, and Patterson followed it with a gain of 20 yards, bringing the ball to midfield. Bruce tried a goal from the field, but kicked into his own scrimmage, and Arts recovered the ball.

Arts gained yards and Drulard broke thru for ten yards more, bringing the play to O. T. C.'s 35-yard line. In the closing session the soldiers held, however, on the next two downs, and gained possession on a safety kick. A short kick was taken by Drulard at Arts' 20-yard line, and gave Arts their chance to tie the score. Flynn broke thru for a 20-yard run, and was injured in the tackle. Drulard gained three more, and Flynn went the same distance. Drulard made a goal from the field; score 9-7. Time was called a minute later.

American College Rugby Football Season Closes on Thursday

Yale's victory over Harvard, which gave the sons of the East the championship of the aristocratic "big three," carried with it a rather empty glory, says a well-known New York critic. "Browns," the Princeton-Yale game, which was a double-clinched hammerlock on the eastern championship.

Misses College knocks the eastern from off their feet with a victory over the Rhode Islanders Thursday, Pollard, and the rest of the Bunnions will glory in an eastern title. At Pittsburg it is excusable to foam around and point to Pittsburg's clean record for the year and claim at least a tie with Brown, but it is impossible to overlook those two clean victories by Brown over Harvard and Yale. LARGE CUTS COMING FOR THE PLAYERS

Chicago, Nov. 28.—Salaries of baseball players in the American league who were signed at high figures to remain there during the war with the Federal league will be sharply reduced, B. B. Johnson, president of the league, announced today. The game was conducted in an extravagant manner during the fight with the Federal league, President Johnson said, and all expenses connected with the operation of the sport next season will be curtailed.

"Now that the trouble is over," he asserted, "we will have to return to a sound basis—one where men who have invested their money in the same stand a chance of obtaining a fair return. There will be no renewal of high salaries contracts. The players must understand that. We will agree on a new contract at the annual meeting of the American league here Dec. 14, that will be fair to all concerned. It will be equitable to the player and to the club owner."

Rugby Renown, Not Skill Earns Money in East

A correspondent of a New York paper tips off the money conditions in eastern Rugby in a letter from Providence: "Dear Sir:—You speak of the big money taken in for football. For the big colleges, yes. But not for the others. The big fellows may talk about the lack of commercialism in college sports, but how about this? In the old days, Brown used to play Harvard on a 40-60 per cent basis. After the game became a big one, Harvard last year informed Brown that she would be dropped from the schedule unless she was willing to accept \$3000 for the game. Brown finally pleaded hard enough for \$5000 to get it. She had to accept this, or be dropped. Ten days ago the Brown-Harvard game drew in about \$40,000. Of this amount, Brown received \$5000 and Harvard \$35,000. Yet Brown was good enough to win, 31 to 0. Did the crowd come out to see the Harvard second eleven, or to see Brown? Is it fair dealing, or isn't it? Is it fair dealing, or not?"
