Commissioner of Education of New York State Gives Address.

Before the regular proceedings at the Empire Club yesterday the following resolution, was unanimously "That the Empire Club of Canada, composed, as it is, of members from

all parts of the Dominion, of various shades of opinion in politics, but a single unit for vigorously prosecuting the war and in support of all measures necessary to immediately reinforce and uphold the strength of our heroic army at the front, firmly believe it to be the patriotic duty of every true Canadian, at the present critical moment in the war, to support the newly-formed mon-party Union-War-Government in the approaching election, and further, that the club believes that the defeat of the war government in the election would mean, a shameful postponement of the country's obligations to our brave sons in the trenches, probably an abandonment of all further war efforts on our part; cheering news to measures necessary to immediately efforts on our part; cheering news to the enemy, and an intolerable dis-grace to the name and fame of

The address was given by John Houston Finley, LL.D., commissioner of education, New York, who proved to be a speaker of great charm, delicate humor, graceful spontaneity and a rare sense of language values. He was seized, he said, as a possible spy, but the blue ribbon awarded him by the French Government had helped him.
