a point on the line of the Toronto &
Hamilton Electric Railway to run
northerly thru Militon, Georgetown and
Acton, traversing the whole county and
obtaining power from the Toronto &
Niagara Power Company. In this way
the downs thru which the railway will
pass will be provided with cheap power
and light and the right of way may be
used for facilitating the distribution of
material for the improvement of wagon
roads.


