FIRE AND BURGLAR PROOF SAFE MANUFACTORY.

TAYLOR'S SAFE WORKS, established by Messrs. James and John Taylor, in 1855, is located at Nos. 37 to 41, Palace street. This is the pioneer establishment in British America. The business has been constantly on the increase, and fifty hands are kept in steady employment.

CHARLES D. EDWARDS, of Montreal, has established an agency at 51 Front e. These safes have a wide reputation for superior excellence, combining all modern improvements with superiority of workmanship.

FOUNDRIES.

GLOBE FOUNDRY, Queen street, head of Bay, established in 1845, by Mr. Edward Beckett, employing about thirty hands and ten-horse power steam. Mr Beckett has a caloric engine of four-horse power, by means of which he is enabled to turn out light castings at an exceedingly short notice; thus parties from any part of the country, coming to Toronto, and desirous of returning with as little delay as possible, can get their castings in an hour or two—at the same time, castings of four tons weight can be turned out. Every description of mill machinery, and agricultural and architec tural work is manufactured.

St. Lawrence Foundry, W Hamilton & Son, 136 Palace street, manufacturers of every description of stationery and portable engines, tobacco machinery, and saw mill machinery, castings and forgings of every kind. Upwards of one hundred hands are kept employed, and an engine of 40-horse power used to propel the machinery.

Ontario Engine and Machine Works-3 Ontario Lane and 209 Queen street east, James Martin & Son, proprietors. Steam engine eight-horse—average ten hands employed. Manufacture steam engines, hydraulic pumps and presses, mill machinery, caddie and box presses, retainers, compresses, &c. Engines made by this firm may be seen at Messrs Rowsell & Hutchison's, J D Lewis', J Carty's, McLeish & Co's, McGregor (rope maker), Synge, (builder), Telegraph and Christian Guardian offices, Boeckh's factory, Greig & Carlyle's &c. The traction engine employed in driving the stone-crusher in the city, was manufactured by this firm.

PLANING, SASH, DOOR AND BLIND FACTORIES, LUMBER DEALERS, &c.

McBean Brothers, sash, door and blind factory, cor Buchapan and Terauley streets. There are 100 men employed in this establishment, and steam power is used. The building is of brick, two stories high. The machinery is ample and the work of first-class quality.

CENTRAL PLANING, SASH, DOOR AND BLIND FACTORY, 71 Adelaide street west, Jacob P. Wagner, proprietor. Upwards of 100 hands are now employed, and thirty horse-power steam is used to propel the machinery.

W. W. COLWELL & Bros., lumber manufacturers—mil's at Harrison's crossing; employ 20 hands; capacity, 20,000 feet a day.

BURKE'S PLANING MILLS, SASH, DOOR AND BLIND FACTORY, situated on the corner of Richmond and Sheppard streets, was established in May, 1867. Every description of mouldings, house furnishings, sashes, doors and blinds, packing-cases, sawing, planing, &c., is done at these mills.

CANADA STAINED GLASS WORKS.

An establishment for the staining and enammelling of glass was commenced in 1856, on Temperance street, by Mr. Joseph McCausland, now removed to 8 King street west, where fourteen hands are employed on house painting, glass staining, &c. The stained glass for the Toronto University, the Government Buildings at Ottawa, and the Government House in Toronto, were supplied by Mr. McCausland, as well as that for St. Stephen's Church, St. Peter's and several other churches and public buildings throughout Canada.

LAST MAKERS.

Messes. Selway & Iredale, cor Sheppard and Richmond streets, emplow six hands and extensive steam power in the manufacture of lasts, boot trees, &c. The business was established about eight years ago.

VINEGAR WORKS.

BAY STREET VINEGAR WORKS.—These works were established in 1859, and are owned and carried on by Mr. Wm. Wilson, at 115 and 117 Bay street. Mr. Wilson now employs about 10 men, and manufactures every description of white wine, malt and cider vinegars. About seventy-five barrels, a week are turned out. The vinegars here made have an excellent reputation, and are manufactured solely from liquors. Mr. Wilson is also extensively engaged in the manufacture of cigar boxes of first-class quality.
