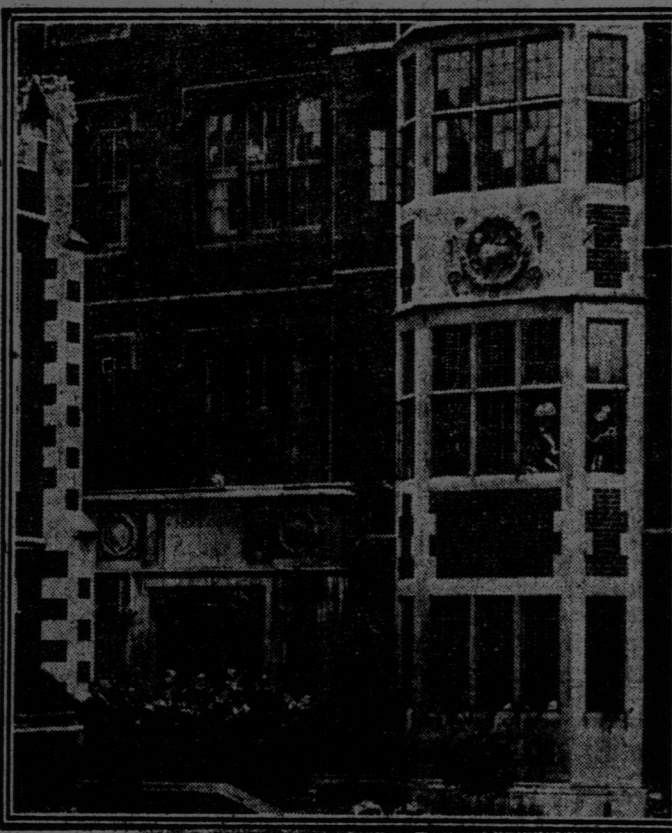

BRITISH AND FRENCH MAKE MORE GAINS IN SOMME FIGHTING

Assaults by British and French forces against the German positions north of the Somme in France have resulted in the gaining of additional ground by the attackers. The French advance was in and around Maurepas, the scene of much hard fighting during the past few weeks, and the British gain was in the direction of Ginchy and Guillemont, near the southern end of their section of the Somme front. The Anglo-French attacks, London says, took place along the whole line from Poisieres to the Somme.

The village was carried by assault and the French position on the Maurepas-Gery road was also extended. British troops advanced successfully in the region of Ginchy and Guillemont, and seized more German positions. London mentions no gain on any other part of this front. The Anglo-French forces captured more than 400 wounded prisoners on their advance. The French offensive continues on the right bank of the Meuse, in the Verdun region, and Paris chronicles the capture of two fortified redoubts northwest of the Thiaumont Works. Progress also is reported for the French east of the Vaux-Chapelle Wood. Berlin reports attacks by the French and British forces north of

the Somme, but says all of them were repulsed, except one, by the British in the section of Martinpuich. A French gain around Fleury, in the Verdun is admitted. There is little activity on the eastern front, according to the official reports. Most of the fighting has been in the Carpathian mountain region, where both the Russians and Austro-Germans claim to have made some slight advances. Petrograd says the Austro-Germans are attacking in Galicia, but with no success. The Teutonic Allies have taken the offensive on the Greco-Serbian frontier, north of Saloniki and Berlin reports the capture of the Greek town of Florina from Serbian troops, according to Berlin. This movement probably is in answer to the recent Entente Allied activity on the same front. Artillery bombardments are taking place on the Austro-Italian front around Gorizia. Rome claims an advance for the Italians in the Trentino.

SLAP FOR SIR SAM HUGHES

Fall of His Hero—Government's Action in Taking Title From J. Wesley Allison Puts Militia Minister in Peculiar Position. (Toronto Telegram) Ottawa, Aug. 14.—The action of the government in tying a tin can, metaphorically, to John Wesley Allison, docking him of his title of honorary colonel and severing their relation with him, occasions considerable comment here. From whatever point it is viewed, the situation is regarded as a curious one for General Sir Sam Hughes and there is great speculation hereabouts as to how he will take it. Not only did the minister of militia proclaim Allison as his "guide, counselor and friend," before the fuse investigation, but during the progress of that inquiry the damaging disclosures against the honorary colonel in no way feased him. When giving evidence the minister availed himself of every occasion to laud the honorary colonel of his own creation and at a grand climax he had prepared a warm defence of Allison and his action. When the commission would not permit him to read it, as part of his evidence, the general declared with much emphasis that he would take other means "of getting the document before the public." He proceeded to hand it out to the newspapers or to such as cared to use it.

Warmly Defended Him. In his cross-examination by E. F. R. Johnston, General Hughes said: "There is no man in the room I would sooner trust than Allison and that is saying a good deal." Other questions brought similar answers. Later, in the House, where they were discussing the small arms ammunition case, General Hughes declared that there was "more honor in Allison's little finger than in the auditor-general's whole carcass." Instances might be multiplied where, on every conceivable occasion, the general elected to put himself in with Allison and defend him against all comers. The position is now one of obvious embarrassment for the minister, who must either turn his back upon Allison or upon his colleagues in the cabinet who have shorn the Morrisonian fringe of wisdom of his military honors. The general impression at Ottawa is that this latest order is another slap in the face of the minister of militia. Incidentally it is an admitted notification of the Kyle charges which were aimed at Allison as the consort of Hughes.
