KAISER WILL ACT AS GODFATHER TO ENCOURAGE LARGER FAMILIES

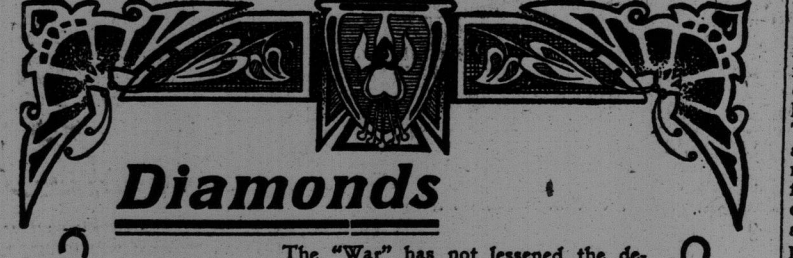

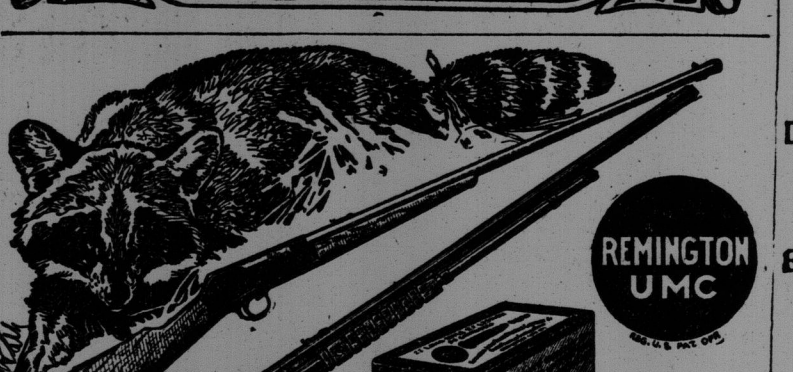

CARMEN ONE OF THE BEST PICTURES THE IMPERIAL HAS SHOWN

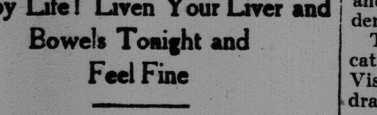

Lucas is a veteran actor and for the last thirty years has been starred in this particular part. He is the centre of interest throughout the picture and his work is dignified and displays a grasp of dramatic values.

Marie Elise, long known as the "Tham-houser Kid," has the part of Little Eva and her characterization of the happy little daughter of St. Clair is charming while her portrayal of the decline and death is worthy of an adult. Topsey, that famous child of nature, who "just growed" is renewed to us by Boots Wall, who very finely depicts the colored girl of the acquiring habits.

Irving Cummings and Theresa Mitchell in the roles of George Harris and Eliza, provide the dramatic interest in the early part of the picture, and the cast numbering twenty-four is good throughout. It is no stage ice on which Eliza crosses the Ohio River, the real article is presented in abundance.

In the scene where little Eva falls overboard from the stern-wheel steamer and Uncle Tom's rescue, the camera registers an excellent scene. It may be safe to presume that this picture as presented last night gave more delight than any feature seen at the Lyric since it adopted the "better picture play" policy. It made a special appeal to the children and delighted the grown-ups. Each and every act was of stirring interest even though the on-looker had read the story many times or had seen the play. The children seemed to be particularly well pleased at the matinee, a special hour having been set for their convenience. These matinees will continue today and tomorrow, and the children will have plenty of time after school to see Uncle Tom's Cabin.
