

DIES IN ESCAPE FROM PRISON TO SEE HIS NEW BABE

Thos. Hammond Drowns at Boston Trying to Reach Shore

SWEPT OUT TO SEA FROM DEER ISLAND

Tied With Tube of Auto Tire as Life Belt

BOSTON, June 29.—Attempting to escape from Deer Island, in order to see his wife and son, just born, Thomas Hammond, 38, of Charlottetown, N. B., died.

He jumped into the harbor with an inflated inner tube of an automobile about him to buoy him up, but instead of carrying him to the other side of the stream and liberty, the tidal currents took him out to sea, where some time during the long night hours, he succumbed to exposure and exhaustion. Hammond was sentenced to the House of Correction Feb. 24 to serve one year for larceny of an automobile.

He pleaded guilty to the charge, but his plea was not accepted.

Later he had been ordered to blow up the Roman Catholic Church. Skelly claimed to have been warned of punishment by the Klan if he failed. Lee afterwards admitted that he had made a good job of the statement said. Lee denied these charges.

ANOTHER SENATOR HAS BEEN NAMED

OTTAWA, June 28.—Daniel D. Reilly, of High River, Alta., has been appointed to the Senate. He succeeds the late Sir James Loughheed in the Alberta vacancy. It is officially announced that the appointment, although only announced this afternoon, was made last week.

Senator Reilly is a prominent rancher of the High River district. He has a ranch adjoining the Prince of Wales and is former president of the Western Canada Stockmen's Association. He has been active in stock raising for many years, and is a pioneer of the district.

Found Near Riverside — Two Men Sentenced by Magistrate Dalton

Following a raid made yesterday at Riverside, Rethby Parish, two men were found 8200 each, and in default of payment lodged in Hampton jail, and another freed of any complicity in the offence. Two stills were seized and will be destroyed.

UNDER SUSPICION

Federal and provincial officers had reason recently to suspect that moonshine liquor was being distilled in the vicinity of Riverside. Just after 4 o'clock yesterday afternoon W. P. Dawes, Alexander Crawford and Roy Armstrong of the inland revenue department, of the Saint John customs house, and Inspectors George Armstrong and Pike, of the prohibitory law enforcement staff in this city, entered the woods on the former Appleby estate which is in charge of Gordon Burnett.

Two well equipped stills and a quantity of liquor and mash were found. Mullen, who was in the vicinity, was placed under arrest, charged with having a still in his possession and Burnett was also taken on the charge that he did allow and suffer to be concealed or kept in a place or premises owned or controlled by him a still suitable for the manufacture of spirits without having given notice thereof as required by law.

GIVEN HEARING

Mullen and Burnett were given a hearing before Magistrate Dalton last night. Burnett pleaded guilty to the charge and he and Inspector Dawes gave evidence as to the alleged operation of the stills by Mullen. The Magistrate fined Burnett and Mullen.
