

STONE FIRM AS MARKET OPENS IN MONTREAL

National Breweries Is Most Active, Followed by Industrial Alcohol

RAILS AND OILS ARE WALL ST. FEATURES

New High Prices For Year Are Established by Several Roads

MONTREAL, Nov. 14.—A firm tone prevailed on the local stock market, in the early trading this morning, and a number of advances were made. National Breweries was the most active issue, gaining 1/4 to 5/8. Industrial Alcohol followed Breweries and rose a similar fraction to 17, the highest point touched in some months. Another strong feature was Consolidated Smelters, up 3/4 to 15 1/2. Laurentide gained 1/4 to 80, as did also Asbestos to 96 1/2, while Brazilian was up 1/2 to 77 1/2. The weak spots were Belgo, down 1/2 to 99 1/2, and Atlantic Sugar, off 1/4 at 83.

HELPS POOR FAMILY

The story of the plight of a family who were discovered in want a few days ago by Police Sergeant T. Mr. Chestnut who brought the first car of this type to Saint John, was endeavoring to get the buckboard started near the Alderdeen school one day when young Foley was leaving for home. Foley helped the man get it going again and later took up work with Mr. Chestnut, succeeding him to the proprietorship.

MEETS COMRADES OF HIS FLYING DAYS

Royden Foley Renews Friendships With Companions in Aviation in U. S.

Royden Foley, 24 Pitt street, has returned after a business trip to the American automobile centres. While in Detroit Mr. Foley had the unexpected pleasure of meeting some of his old friends and workfellows of flying days in the war period and to meet and talk over early times of aeroplaning with a man with whom he worked at Mineola, N. Y. It will be recalled by some that Royden Foley was considered one of Canada's authoritative sources of information on aeroplane mechanics and a pilot of more than national note.

Mr. Foley's work in the field of aeroplanes did not begin as an emergency of war but away back in the early days of heavier-than-air machines he graduated from the Pratt Institute of Science and Technology in Brooklyn and having a keen interest in the new art of flying, became attached to the active staff of the famous inventor Orville and Wilbur Wright at Mineola, New York. It was here the Saint John pilot received his training as pilot and learned about aeroplane motors as a practical worker.

FIRST DISTANCE FLIGHT
When the inventor Macey made the first distance flight from New York to Philadelphia it was Royden Foley, who alone accompanied and assisted him, giving attention to the mechanical details of this experiment that startled the world and for a time gave United States world-leadership in the flying game. Mr. Foley is modest about his flying career but some Saint John people know that he brought lustre to the fame of the city in this regard.

During the war the Saint John pilot was retained at Mineola to teach his fellow countrymen of the Royal Flying Corps the new game. He was one of the chief assistants of the Wright Bros. in getting the Canadian and American armies supplied with pilots. Then Mr. Foley secured his release so that he too could go to the front.

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U. S. GIVES LEAGUE ARMAMENT DATA

Co-operates Towards Study For Projected Parley on Army Cuts

GENEVA, Nov. 13.—Co-operating with the League of Nations, the United States Government has helped towards the preparatory study for the projected international conference on the reduction of armaments by forwarding to Geneva complete information on the military, naval and air forces of the United States.

These statistics which cover a wide field and include even such matters as industries capable of being used for war purposes, will appear in the League of Nations' armament year book for 1925, which will be a compilation of figures embracing the armaments of 52

countries, including the United States and Russia.

As the United States is not a member of the League of Nations it is not bound by Article VIII. of the covenant which relates to interchange of armament information between all members. Responsible officials of the League have expressed their appreciation to the United States authorities for their act of courtesy in co-operating in the work.

COUNCIL TO PREPARE

Preparatory arrangements for the disarmament conference will be probably started by what is known as Council No. 2, which is to assemble at Geneva in the early days of December and which will concentrate its activities on the problems of disarmament.

This council will make recommendations concerning the creation of a new general disarmament commission to carry on technical preparations for the conference which will be convoked as soon as the regular council of the League decides that European security had reached a state which will render
