Thirteen Presidents of Board of Trade Are Still Living

MORE THAN CENTURY IN EXISTENCE,
ST. JOHN ORGANIZATION HAS BEEN
LED BY 96 PROMINENT CITIZENS

Lauchland Donaldson Holds Record of Service With
Eighteen Years in Chair; Hon. John Robertson
Second With Thirteen Years.

The St. John Board of Trade, which has been in existence for more than 100 years, during its first stages being called the Chamber of Commerce, is still going strong and doing much excellent work for the benefit of the city.

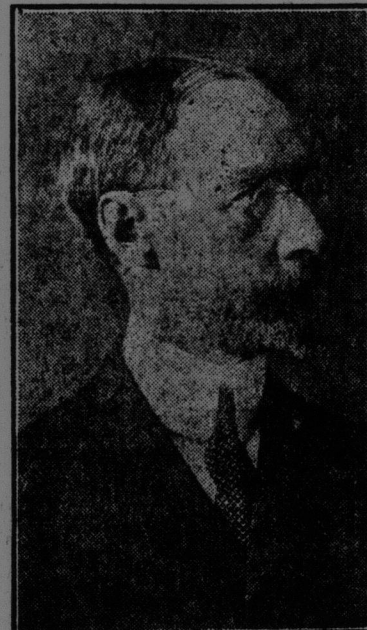
During its more than a century of usefulness some of the most prominent men of the city have been connected with it and have given freely of their time to act as officers and members of the council. Ninety-six men have filled the position of president of the board. Of that number thirteen are still living and taking an active part in matters pertaining to the welfare of their home city.

The record for length of service as president goes to Lauchland Donaldson, who filled the office for eighteen years—from 1880 to 1898, 1897 to 1908, and 1904 to 1917, all dates included in the three cases. Next in length of service comes Hon. John Robertson, who filled the chair for thirteen years, from 1884 to 1897, and 1898 to 1911. Hon. William Black served seven years, from 1821 to 1827.

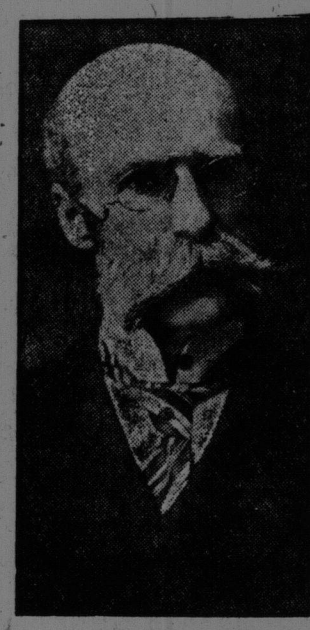

In St. John, interest in the Methodist Missionaries has centred around Rev. E. C. Hennigar, formerly of this city, and his wife, a former resident of Sackville. Mr. Hennigar's father, E. S. Hennigar, 26 Orange street, received the news of his son's safety in a telegram from the Toronto offices of the board yesterday afternoon.

Major Burrows of the Salvation Army received definite word of the safety of the army officers through Commissioner Sowton, in Toronto. Commissioner Sowton received a cablegram from London announcing that all the European officers in Japan were safe. To Major Burrows the news has brought instant relief as he has been most anxious concerning his son and word received previously had not been so explicit.
