BOWLING.

Games Last Evening.

Washington, March 15.—Clyde Milan, new manager of the Washington Baseball Club, gave notice that he places a high value on discipline, when he indefinitely suspended Leon Goslin, the young Columbia, S. C. recruit, whose performance last season had earned him a regular outfield berth for this year.

Milan, who said he took the action regretfully and only after every effort to get Goslin within the ropes at the Nationals' Tampa, Fla., training camp, declared the young outfielder had "broken practically every training rule of the camp."

Red Sox Are Suggestive.

Boston, March 15.—Hugh Duffy's renovated Red Sox are a slugging outfit. In one workout at their Hot Springs training camp twenty balls were smacked over fences. Joe Harris, George Burns, Elmer Smith, John Collins and Eddie Foster were the clouters. "Last year if one of the players knocked the ball out of this park," Manager Duffy remarked, "we thought it wonderful. If this keeps up we will have to figure what is the matter if they fail to do so."

Dugan Ranks High.

Boston, March 15.—Harry H. Frazer, president of the British Athletics, says he has turned down a proposal for a player's purchase that would surpass all others of the kind. "I have been offered and have refused more money for Joe Dugan than I received for Babe Ruth," was the statement attributed to him by newspaper men at Hot Springs, Ark., the Red Sox training camp.

In figures, that was taken to mean that approximately \$150,000 was placed as the value of the shortstop who came to the Boston Club during the winter in a three-cornered trade, after making his mark as a member of the Athletics. Frazer has been credited with having received between \$125,000 and \$150,000 for Ruth.

NEWFOUNDLAND IS MORE OPTIMISTIC

St. John's, Nfld., March 14.—Before a large and distinguished gathering of the citizens of St. John's, His Excellency Sir Alexander Harris, the governor, opened this afternoon the third session of the twenty-fourth general assembly of Newfoundland. With a speech from the throne that was by no means so pessimistic as many Newfoundlanders anticipated. His Excellency referred to the fact that the year now ending is equal to the estimate submitted in the budget speech of last session and exceeds the expenditure of the country by over \$100,000.

The speech also announced legislative proposals for the operation of the railroad.

A. W. COVEY'S REPLY TO CRITICS

Says Financial Statement of A. A. U. Was Published—More Than Hundred Affidavits Received Going to Yarmouth.

A flat contradiction of the criticism of the baseball meeting at Fredericton on Monday evening, that there was a lack of financial statements showing the receipts and expenditures of the registration and sanction fees, was made by A. W. Covey here last night. He said that a financial statement, showing all these items, was submitted at the regular meeting of the association and was audited by a chartered accountant and was then given to the press for publication. He referred his critics to the files of the newspapers to verify his statements.

When questioned regarding the affidavits, Mr. Covey said that he had received more than 100 here to date, and he did not know how many had been forwarded to the office at Halifax. He said that they were coming in fast and he expected that the larger portion of the athletes, who took the affidavit, would do so before the end of the month. He announced that he was going to Yarmouth next Tuesday to attend a meeting which had been called in that town to discuss the baseball and track and field prospects for the coming season. He said that delegates from the entire shore of Nova Scotia would be present at the meeting.

Mr. Covey said that he had received the affidavits of eighteen hockey players in Sussex and that these had been accepted by the following resolution from the Sussex Amateur Athletic Club: "Whereas, the president of the M. P. B. A. U. of C. has deemed it necessary, under the existing conditions of all amateur sports, to withdraw all amateur cards and ask all amateurs, who took part in any branch of sports previous to 1914, or since November, 1919, to send in sworn affidavits as to their amateur standing; and whereas, the merits of this action have been discussed and pronounced in the public press;

"Therefore, be it resolved, that the executive of the Sussex Amateur Athletic Club here assembled do heartily approve and endorse the action of the president in this matter."

"Signed on behalf of the executive of the S. A. A. C., G. F. Bolton."

CANADIANS CAN USE QUEER CLUBS

Golf Association Asked to Rule on Mooted Question.

Toronto, March 14.—Dates for Canadian golf championships during the summer have been fixed as follows by the executive committee of the Royal Canadian Golf Association:

Canadian amateur championship, Hamilton Golf and Country Club, week of June 19.

Open championship, Mount Bruno Golf Club, July 28 to 29.

Ladies' championships, Toronto Golf Club, September 11.

The executive committee discussed at some length the ruling of the golf committee of the Royal and Ancient Golf Club of St. Andrew's, disapproving of the use of corrugated, slotted or grooved golf clubs, and withholding permission for the use of such clubs under the rules of golf.

Members of the executive committee from Halifax, Calgary and other points made representations in regard to this rule. The executive finally adopted a resolution concluding as follows: "Be it resolved that until such time as the rules of golf committee of the Royal and Ancient Golf Club, corrugated, grooved or slotted club, the Royal Canadian Golf Association will not adopt the said rule, and that for competitions of this association, the rules of golf as adopted by the Royal and Ancient Golf Club of St. Andrew's be modified to that extent."

In connection with the amateur championship rules suggestions had been received favoring a qualifying round of 36 holes, with 32 qualifying, following this with 36-hole matches each day throughout the week, the finals being completed on Saturday. The British committee have considered this system, and decided to not adopt this method for this year's championship, but to get further information on the subject. The
