### ALL GRAINS TO EXCEED YIELDS OF LAST YEAR

Bureau of Statistics Estimate 1922 Yield in Canada at 920,000 Bushels—20,000,000 Bushels in Excess of Last Year.

Canada's wheat crop this year is estimated at 920,000,000 bushels, or slightly more than 20,000,000 bushels larger than the final estimate of last year's crop, by the Dominion Bureau of Statistics. This estimate is based on the conditions prevailing throughout Canada at the end of last month and is arrived at by compiling data received from crop correspondents of the department.

The estimated yield of oats is 509,762,000 bushels, as compared with 486,222,000 bushels last year, and of barley 64,881,000 bushels, as against 69,708,100 bushels in 1921.

It is estimated that the yield of rye will be 97,848,000 bushels, as compared with 11,465,280 last year, and flaxseed 4,800,000 bushels, in comparison with 11,160,000 bushels in 1921.

The estimated yield of potatoes, 102,974,000 bushels, is equal to the last year's final estimate, which was 107,345,000 bushels.

Fall Wheat. The average yield per acre of fall wheat is estimated to be 22 1/4 bushels, as against 21 1/2 bushels last year.

The total yield of wheat and clover is estimated at 15,446,000 tons, which is the largest on record with the exception of that for 1916, when the yield was 16,040,000 tons. Last year the total yield was only 11,866,100 tons.

Of alfalfa (first cutting) the total yield is 88,880 tons, as against 662,200 tons in 1921.

### PULPWOOD TRADE GROWS RAPIDLY

The shipment of pulpwood from the maritime provinces to Portland has grown to such proportions that a large fleet of freighters is now engaged in this traffic. The original consignment of 18,000 cords of pulpwood to the Oxford Paper Co. has been increased materially and, because of this, the Norwegian steamer Otto has been added to the fleet and will ply between Portland and Murray, Cape Breton.
