REVIEW OF THE SITUATION IN THE BIG LEAGUES

New York, June 14.—Cincinnati ousted Brooklyn from the National League leadership and the New York Americans overpowered Cleveland and brought about a virtual tie in that league, although several points behind the Indians in the league standing.

With the two leading teams in each league fighting each other, the St. Louis Cardinals loom up as a rival to Cincinnati and Brooklyn.

Cincinnati was far from world series form in the New York series, but showed to better advantage against Brooklyn, Brooklyn is averaging only about two runs a game since returning to its home grounds, while the pitchers are proving ineffective against the western visitors.

St. Louis, in the midst of its first winning streak, is meeting little opposition in the east. The Cardinals have won eleven of their last fourteen games, Chicago dropped from the top of the league to fourth place in two weeks, winning its first victory on Saturday in eleven games. Boston and Pittsburgh showed much improvement over the previous weeks. Exchange of shortstops by New York and Philadelphia apparently gave the Cardinals a new lease on life.

In the American League, Cleveland and New York seemingly have nothing to fear at present from the other teams. Good pitching aided the Indians last week but yesterday the Yankees pounded victory gives him fifteen points in the national championship competition. Eaton is second with seven.

GOLF. No American Team. Philadelphia, June 14.—An American golf team will not compete in the Olympic at Antwerp, according to an announcement by Max Marston of this city, who was chosen to captain the team and who had charge of the arrangements. He said that after making reservations for a team of eight men to sail on June 25, he had found it impossible to get a representative team together.

RECORD-BREAKING TROUT. Allentown, Pa., June 14.—Dr. Charles E. Milson caught a trout twenty-seven inches long and weighing nine pounds, ten ounces, in the Little Lehigh Creek at Robert's Bridge. He landed the fish after a fifteen-minute battle. It is believed to be the largest trout ever taken in a running stream in Pennsylvania.

TO SHOOT FALLS IN BARREL. London, Eng., June 14.—The adventurous Bristol barter, C. G. Stephens, who intends to shoot Niagara Falls in a barrel, has now completed all his arrangements. The barrel has been thoroughly tested and found satisfactory. It is six feet high, seven feet one inch in circumference at each end and eight feet eight inches in the center. Oak, two inches thick, was used in construction. There is a heavy iron plate at the bottom, and a further balance weight of sixty pounds is lead to keep the barrel vertical. The lid can be released from the inside.

Made to Eat Pickles. London, Eng., June 14.—The story of a ten-year-old girl who was forced to eat a jar of pickles, chilies and peppercorns included, was told at Grimsby when Harriet Speck was charged with cruelty towards Evelyn May Harvey. The woman, it was said, had knocked down and kicked the child, whom she had adopted. She was sentenced to 21 days' imprisonment.
